KENT, June 27.—The Kent "mystery" is nearing completion. This is a big shop to employ 100 men being built here. Some months ago two men giving their names as Gregory and Dickinson of Tacoma, came here and bought two acres for a factory for eastern men. No machinery has arrived and not a whisper has been heard when the plant will start or what will be produced.


FISHERMAN HOOKS A GRIZZLY BEAR
