Frederick Townsend Martin On What He Saw and Thought at Coronation

The magnificent house at 95 Piccadilly, London, was hired for coronation day by Otto Kuhn, the noted New York banker. Among his guests was Frederick Townsend Martin, the society leader whose recent book, "The Passing of the Idle Rich," has stirred the country. He wrote this article especially for the Times.—Editor.

All the guests about me represented gold. As I lay in my bed on the eve of the coronation, sleep was impossible because of the cries and roars of the people below my window, waiting throughout the night to see their monarch pass by. Being poor, they had been unable to purchase places and had to remain in their positions on the curbstone all night.

Was it the love of their king which prompted them to undergo this long and weary vigil; or was it some instinct of the past which aroused in them a desire to see a tangible relic of the history of bygone days when kings were thus wont to impress on an ignorant people the undisputed power of an absolute monarchy?

I looked down at them and tried to feel as they did. I think that they were more amused than impressed by this spectacle of bygone greatness. Education has made them realize and appreciate their power. Every last man of them knew that, if a bad and corrupt king were to arise, one who neglected the interests of the people, he would be removed from the throne and a republic proclaimed throughout the land.

It seemed to me that the poor watchers in the street showed far more interest and enthusiasm for the bands, with their music, than they actually displayed when the king himself appeared.

A great majority were men and women earning their bread by the sweat of their brows. Many, surely, were in want for the necessities of life; their garments and their faces told the truth.

Did not vast numbers of them feel as I did, that it would have been better to have spent less gold on this occasion and that it would have been more fitting had their king and queen gone in a simple way to the old abbey, together to approach the altar and beseech the blessing of God Almighty upon their reign?

Though the king has the power to resurrect this magnificent pageant, belonging to another time, another age and another less brilliant period of reason, the people of England today know that the money for such a display comes from THEM and from THEIR WORK.

The people, I think, felt, "Our king comes from a long line of kings, honored and dishonored, a line centuries old; yet it is WE, the people, who keep him king."

And so, over the world today, in all nations, the thralldom of monarchy is passing. The people are understanding that all power—even the power which sometimes oppresses them—comes from THEM, and that THEY, working together, are more powerful than any other thing in the world.

He Favors Reciprocity Because Hines Doesn't

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., July 19.—Lauding the Canadian reciprocity agreement as "a cornerstone for a new tariff system which will contain honest protective duties and will end forever unnecessary and excessive duties," Senator Brown of Nebraska today urged the passage of President Taft's pet measure upon the senate.

Brown said one reason he favored the bill was because Edward Hines, the Chicago lumberman accused of having corruptly aided

in the election of Senator Lorimer is opposed to it.

"When I find this man Hines," said Senator Brown, "who for years has been head of the lumber lobby and the lumber combine before the senate and house committees—and who also elected a senator now and then—leading a personal assault upon the president and assaulting this law in the name of God and for the sake of the farmer, I began to think there is something in the bill which ought to command the respect and support of every honest man."

San Diego Breaks Ground For Exposition Today

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SAN DIEGO, Cal., July 19.—Ground will be broken for San Diego's exposition this afternoon when John Barrett, head of the bureau of South and Central American Republics, special envoy of President Taft, turns the first spadeful of earth in the city park. The ceremonies will be

preceded by a big military, naval and civic parade in which hundreds will participate and a number of dignitaries are scheduled to speak during the exercises.

Tonight a big water carnival will be held on the bay, and King Cabrillo is to be ushered through the streets. Queen Ramona will be crowned this evening.

DENIES SUGAR CO. IS TRUST

(By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, July 19.—Resuming his testimony before the Hardwick committee of the house which is probing the sugar trust, President Washington B. Thomas today denied that the American Sugar Refining company is a monopoly and declared that its policy had always been "live and let live."

Thomas vigorously denied the intimation that a fair physical valuation of the trust's property would not exceed \$40,000,000, although it is paying dividends on \$90,000,000.

Miss Edith Snow was 18 when Stillings stole her away from a proud Boston home. It was considered imprudent for the runaways to remain in the United States so Mr. Stillings, at the time 23 years of age, made a dash for Canada.

Upon arrival in Vancouver in

1909 the "call of the wild" sounded to Mr. and Mrs. Stillings. So they took boat to the Skeena river country, located land near Hazelton and lived in that district continuously until their first return to civilization last night.

Mrs. Stillings' parents are Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Snow, Claremont, N. Y. They will go back to their home in the wilderness.
