How Tarnished Titles Snare Rich American Widows---By An Heiress Who Escaped


CHICAGO, July 19.—One rich American widow has escaped the titled fortune hunters of Europe. It is Mrs. S. Ella Wood Dean, just back from abroad with a whole heart, she says—although here is a certain Russian nobleman who might, etc.

Anyhow, Mrs. Dean tells how her fair self and her superlatively fair fortune—several millions—were hunted in Europe. "It is astonishing how brazenly an eligible American woman with money is pursued over there," says Mrs. Dean.

"I had scarcely landed in London when I received letters from several matrimonial agencies, offering to introduce me to these 'poor but honest' titles. Here's an extract from one agent's 'confidential' letter to me, telling how he gets in touch with the masculine part of the sketch: 'If I want to get hold of a peer or a titled man, I always get them through the smaller clubs and I am introduced to the peer by my right name, which is not the one I sign to this letter. JUST ABOUT BUGS

THE MOTH AND HOW TO BEAT HIS GAME The modern housewife, finding herself outwitted by the moth and her wardrobe ruined, hath need of much fortitude and a new supply of benzine.

Early in the spring the moth changes from the chrysalis or pupa to a winged creature, usually known as a miller—so called from the white dust on its wings. In May or June it begins to lay its eggs. Of course the whole object is to prevent the miller from laying its eggs in the garment. Once deposited there they will hatch in due time, and the larvae, or worms, which we call moths, begin their feast. To kill moths in a carpet, set a hot flatiron on the spot infested. The use of strips of tar paper will prevent the laying of eggs under the edge of the carpet.

The miller seems to know instinctively that the best place for its eggs is a soiled spot in a woolen garment or a piece of fur. Thorough cleansing is half the battle; packing away is the other half. OF ALL THE CLEANSERS USED, BENZINE IS THE BEST, and of all the odorous detergents, TAR PAPER (building felt) IS THE MOST EFFECTIVE and at the same time cheap and convenient. To clean furs use mahogany sawdust wet with benzine. Mahogany sawdust can usually be obtained at the drug stores. If not to be obtained, use clean, gritty sand heated as hot as convenient to handle. The heated particles will melt out the greasy dirt and the grit will cut out the dry grit. Rub the sand through the furs thoroughly and then beat out air, but don't sneeze.

For woolen garments, wash soiled spots with benzine, rubbing around the edge of the spot thoroughly, so as not to leave a dark ring. Line a chest, box or even a whole closet with tar paper, wrapping each piece in brown paper to keep from soiling. A day's airing in the fall will remove the smell of tar from the garments. Tar is more effective than camphor, tobacco, moth balls, etc.

Dear Miss Grey: (1) What dishes are to be set on a large centerpiece? (2) What kind of dish and spoon should one use for chow-chow? (3) Please give me a chocolate icing for cake—one that will not get hard.—Young Housekeeper.

A.: (1) If for a benefit luncheon, the punch bowl. If the centerpiece is over the table cloth for dinner, it depends entirely on the arrangement of the table and the taste of the housewife. (2) Any shallow pickle dish, and a small serving spoon or pickle fork. (3) Add 1 well beaten egg which has been mixed with ¼ cup pow-

dered sugar, a dash of salt and 1 teaspoon vanilla to 3 ounces melted chocolate and 3 tablespoons cream. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. When cool, fill and cover cake.

Dear Miss Grey: How should one answer an invitation to commencement, and is it necessary to send a gift? PERPLEXED.

A.: Simply write a note of congratulation. A gift is not required.

Boy Scout Signal Notes

Five traveling secretaries will be sent out from national headquarters in the fall, to visit local scout organizations, helping them grow in numbers and usefulness.
