ORDER CUT IN INLAND RATES

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Inland shippers won a victory before the interstate commerce commission yesterday when the Spokane rate case was decided. The railroads have been charging a much higher rate from the east to inland points like Spokane and Reno than for the haul clear to the coast. Their defense was that they made the coast rate lower to meet water competition. The commission knocked out the "short haul" argument and ordered a material cut in inland rates after October 1.


Blame Railroad For Bad Wreck

SALEM, Ore., July 25.—Speed in excess of the limits of safe operation, had service on the curves, and a rocking effect due to subnormal gauge are the causes assigned by the Oregon state railroad commission for the fatal wreck on the Oregon Trunk railway July 10, which resulted in the death of seven passengers, and the injury of 17 others. The full report of the findings of the commission have been sent to the district attorney of the seventh judicial district and to the headquarters of the railroad company.

Seattle Takes Step Toward Single Tax

That the single tax movement, stimulated by the success of its operation in British Columbia and Alberta, is making some headway in Washington is indicated by an unusual suggestion made at Seattle yesterday by Councilman Erickson, an avowed single taxer. In revising the building code, Erickson suggested that the license fee be cut out entirely. The motion failed on a tie vote but will probably carry with the vote of one councilman who was absent. "Every time you tax a man for putting up a building," said Erickson, "you make it that much harder for a man to improve his property. We ought to encourage improvements, not discourage them by taxes." The single taxers figure that a tax laid on land values alone would immensely stimulate building and development work. It has had that effect in Canada where it has been tried. Oregon is moving toward this by a constitutional amendment allowing each county to raise its taxes as it sees fit.


