

29 Players Sold To Majors

Sixty thousand dollars' worth of ball players in one year from one league—and a class B league at that. Not a bad record, but that is what the Northwest league will do this year. Already 19 have been sold to big league clubs for fancy figures, and 10 more are as good as bargained for. These 29 will bring a price of \$56,000, or \$1,931.03 per player. That doesn't count the drafted players, and there are sure to be several, so that the total number of players is sure to reach 35, and the total purchase price \$83,000. The Northwest league has smashed all records and then some. President Shreeder stated Saturday that more money would change hands this year for players than during the last five years in this league. He thought more players and more money would be involved in this year's deals in the Northwest than in the both coast leagues in the last three seasons.

HOT ROW BREWING AMONG LEAGUE MAGNATES — JOE COHN AFTER SCALP OF BOB BROWN AND LEAGUE PRESIDENT.

SEATTLE, Aug. 18.—"All bunk—just some more of Joe Cohn's rantings. There will be no special meeting today—or if there is one, I won't be there. I have trouble enough of my own without listening to Joe Cohn's." That's the way Dave Dugdale puts the kibosh on the proposed meeting of the magnates yesterday. President Wattalett of the Victoria team also took it as a joke. "I signed it just for fun," said Watty. Both Wattalett and Dugdale declare the talk of ousting Lindsay is the purest sort of nonsense. They say Cohn's real purpose in putting in asking for a meeting is to thresh out his trouble with Bob Brown.

After the "exhibition" in Vancouver last Friday Brown got out a warrant for Ostfeld, who had to duck down. He also barred Joe Cohn from the park. They didn't hold any meeting and President Lindsay wasn't fired yesterday, but things seem to be in an unholly mess in league politics. Shreeder and Cohn both went over to Seattle, as did Bob Brown, but that's all. Dugdale is blamed for breaking up the plans. Shreeder denied that there was any plan to dismiss Lindsay, but it's undeniable that there's a lot of bad feeling around the magnates' table.


