Cy Young Signs With Boston Veteran Pitcher Won't Quit



BOSTON, Aug. 19.—Old "Cy" Young, veteran pitcher of the baseball world, is not ready yet to admit after 22 years' pitching in the major leagues, that he is down and out. Released unconditionally Tuesday by Cleveland, Cy announced his intention of sticking around and keeping in practice. "I'll catch on somewhere," he said. Today Cy signed up with the Boston Nationals, reporting tomorrow. He is elated. "I think I've got about ten years' work in me yet," he said. Young in his prime was one of the best pitchers in the game. He has always taken good care of himself. He is able to retire, as he has a fine farm down in Ohio and has earned about \$100,000 during his diamond career, but he loves the game. The ump's yesterday seemed to be up a tree. 


BIG FIGHT IN LEAGUE SUNDAY

WHO'S WHO IN SPORTDOM AND WHY

Just figuring on "dope" alone, it is hard for even a loyal Tacoma fan to see just what license the Tigers have to beat Spokane this week. Except in the pitcher's box, the Indians seem to have it on us almost all the way around. Eddie Burns, of course, is a better catcher than either Spiesman or Ostliek, but it is very doubtful if either Seibt or Spencer are. Spiesman is a dangerous pinch hitter who usually comes through when needed. Both of our sub catchers are weak sticklers. Bill Fisher plays the best first base in the league, but only hits the ball about half as often as Nordyke. Tauscher isn't in the same class with Cartwright as a fielder or batter, while Cooney has it on Morse and probably on Burns when the little catcher is playing out of position. In addition Cooney is dangerous on bases and bushels of ginger. Coleman plays perhaps a cleaner third than Miles Netzel, but the veteran has it on him at the bat, and is a bad man on the bases. Little Johnny Bassey is a wonder in the field, and slams the ball hard when he does hit, and steals many bases. Zimmerman plays a creditable fielding game and hits oftener. Mike Lynch is batting as well as Kippert lately, and taking every chance. But Kippert is faster on the bases and would be more likely to get the hard driven fly that is almost impossible to get than Mike is, on account of his speed. As an outfielder Ed Kennedy is probably the equal of Melchior, also on the bases and at the bat. Ed isn't sure enough in the infield though he has lots of "pop" and is an asset to the team. Either Kennedy or Melchior have something on Abbott in the outfield. So it comes back to the pitchers. Annis, Gordon, Schmutz, Baker, Higgins and Miller, as classy a stable of twirlers as there is in the league
