

# Trails Husband and Woman--and Forgives

(By United Press Leased Wire.)  
 MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—Traveling 12,000 miles to intercept her husband, who had deserted her for another woman, having him arrested in Montreal three hours after taking a warrant out, and leaving the courthouse today, agreeing to forget and forgive and live life anew, was the startling story of Mrs. Hemicus Van Rooy of Antwerp. As soon as she saw her runaway husband she released and withdrew the charge of desertion, and is now willing to pardon him.

About four months ago Hemicus Van Rooy left Antwerp and his wife, taking with him another woman, whose husband had been buried on the morning of their departure. They set sail for America, and he found employment for a few weeks, and finally landed in Montreal where he has been for about three months.

# Atwood Determined to Reach New York Today

 ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 23.—Reconsidering his decision to make his flight down the Hudson river to New York without pontoons attached to his aeroplane, Aviator Atwood telephoned to Albany from South Castleton shortly after 10 o'clock today ordering copper pontoons sent to him immediately.

Atwood passed Rotterdam Junction, 34 miles from here, at 8:15 and reached Albany at 9:02 o'clock. Without a stop, Atwood cut over the city and headed south down the river, flying at an altitude of about 250 feet. His machine was working beautifully, as attested by the steady purr of the motor and the aviator evidently decided that his original plan of stopping at the capital city to attach pontoons to his aeroplane would be a useless waste of time.

He landed on a hill just outside of Castleton, however, at 9:13 o'clock to examine his machine and replenish the gasoline supply. Castleton is 67 miles from Fort Plain and 124 miles north of New York.

FORT PLAIN, N. Y., Aug. 23.—Determined to reach New York today at all hazards, Aviator Harry N. Atwood ascended from here at 7:25 o'clock this morning and headed for the Hudson river.

"I have wasted too much time already," Atwood said just before the start, "and I intend to keep on going today. If such a thing is possible, I shall reach New York before night."

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# 5,000 Affected By S. P. 'Retrenchment'

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—About 5,000 persons are affected today by the Southern Pacific's order of retrenchment in California. It is estimated that 2,000 are being laid off in the vicinity of San Francisco; 1,200 at Los Angeles; and the balance at points all along the line.

Office clerks as well as shopmen are feeling the reduction, which officials say is due to lack of business.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—F. G. Athearn, head of the department of economics of the Southern Pacific company, said today that by tonight about 500 of the 3,400 office employes here will have been laid off, in line with the general order to reduce expenses.

All over the Pacific division the office force will be reduced from 10 to 12 per cent.

# McCredie Suspended By President Graham

No mention is made in the report of Judge W. W. McCredie, the Portland manager's uncle, who also is said to have attacked Hildebrand.

# Rough Riders Strike Is Threatened

Labor leaders here predict that if the working force is reduced it will precipitate a strike in the shops here and on the road.

ROUGH OR CLOGGED SKINS—The skin can be cleared of local impurities and made soft and satiny by using this cream-jelly: Into a half-pint water put an ounce almond and two teaspoonfuls glycerine. Stir and let stand over night. Use frequently and massage into skin until it vanishes. This cream-jelly removes blackheads, pimples and redness and rounds out hollows. As the atmosphere cream-jelly is grassless, it will not grow hairs.

FOR THE TOO-FAT—Excess weight can be removed without discomfort if the parnotis treatment is employed. To one and one-half ounce hot water add four ounces parnotis. When cool strain and take a tablespoonful before meals. Scoop this up until desired weight is attained. The use of parnotis is not harmful in any way and it does not leave the skin flabby or wrinkled.

TO BRIGHTEN THE EYES—To relieve smarting or make the eyes clear and sparkling, use a crystal eye-tonic, made by dissolving an ounce of crystals in a pint of cold water. Put two or three drops of this in each eye twice daily. This is fine for granulated lids or other eye troubles, and for dull or expressionless eyes is a wonderful aid.
