


SENSATION EXPECTED IN TRIAL

20,000 Vets at Rochester

It's Quake-Proof and Fire-Proof Cyclone-Proof and Flood-Proof



HERE'S A NOVEL STUNT IN ARCHITECTURE AND POPULAR MECHANICS, AND A GOOD HOUSE, TOO.

Here is a house that is earthquake-proof, fire-proof, cyclone-proof, flood-proof and vermin-proof. It is the idea of an enterprising architect. A cyclone might blow such a house from its foundations, but only roll it over without breaking it to pieces. An earthquake might shake it about over the front lawn, but could hardly affect its integrity. Water cannot touch it and fire holds no threat for it. Properly anchored upon foundations of concrete it appears to form one of the most substantial kinds of building for man's dwelling that man has yet devised.

The frame is built like a basket, of steel tubing and steel wire, so woven together that it forms a practically indestructible whole. The uprights, standing on a foundation of stone or concrete, are of six-inch tubing, filled with cement. The girders, also of tubing, of the same weight or lighter as the case may demand, are coupled to the uprights with malleable iron fittings, bolted through holes.

Wire, stretched tightly from girder to girder and from upright to upright and intermeshed so as to form what is virtually a basket-weave, then provides the skeleton of the floors and walls. Wire-cloth or expanded metal is placed between two walls of heavy wire, and concrete is then laid in, plaster-like, upon this foundation. All portions of the wires and tubing are covered with cement, and, as the tubes are filled with the same material, no rust can attack any portion of the whole. Another advantage is that no wooden forms are necessary for the moulding of the concrete, as it clings to the wire-cloth just as plaster does to lath.
