


Air Meet At Boston

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 BOSTON, Aug. 26.—Flyers of the two continents are entered in the second annual Harvard-Boston aviation meet beginning today on Atlantic field at Squantum. The contests of the air men will continue daily until September 4. Between \$40,000 and \$50,000 in prizes will be awarded.
 A cross country flight will be a feature of the meet each day. Grahame-White of England, and Weymann and Tabureau of France, will compete against the leading aviators of America, including Atwood, Curtis, Ovington and several others.
 Mile. Helene Durtieux of France, and Mrs. "Jimmy" Martin of England, are entered in the competitions. Both are accomplished and daring bird-ladies.

Orders For Lay Off Received

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 26.—The long expected blow has fallen on the local railroad shippers. The order arrived today to lay off 20 per cent of the force. As there are about 3500 men employed here, the retrenchment will throw out about 700 men indefinitely.
 Sentiment as to a strike is divided. Many of the men do not approve of the demand of the federation, saying they are unreasonable.

CHINESE EXECUTION GROUND AN ALLEY WHERE 6,000 HAVE LOST THEIR HEADS



Canton, China.
 Dear Bill:
 We have been to the execution grounds to see a decapitation. The day before we arrived they had a big celebration, when 80 revolutionists lost their heads. Canton has an atmosphere about it—the vilest imaginable. The streets are dirty and the odors are many and complex. We walked through the jade and silk shops and it was hard to get by in spite of disagreeable thoughts about the 60 per cent duty that awaits us at San Francisco.
 We passed the feather pin factory where kingfishers are plucked and their feathers are stamped into hat pins and belt buckles. Tourists are also plucked here. Crowds of natives gathered around us frequently, but we could easily get rid of them by pointing our cameras in their direction. They're afraid of having their pictures taken.
 It rained before we reached the execution grounds and we were drenched and in a proper frame of mind to see a man or two beheaded. The execution place was merely an alley. The executioner hurried up when he saw us. He carried his enormous knife. He said he was sorry no executions were scheduled for that day. He said he had chopped off 6000 heads in his time, and for a tip he showed us how it was done. He walked up to the chopping block, swished his knife through the air and said, with a wink, "One chop."
 One joyful thing we experienced in Canton. We had dinner at the United States consulate and Mrs. Bergholtz, mother of the consul, served johnny cake and creamed cod fish.
