GOTCH WON'T PREDICT WINNER IN BIG MATCH

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 4.—Contrary to custom, Frank Gotch sets a precedent by not breaking into print with lengthy interviews stating what he will do to George Hackenschmidt when they meet Monday.

The writer has it straight from Gotch that he will not give any interviews regarding the winner in the coming match. "All I have to say is that I will be in the best condition and will struggle for all there is in me to win. Hackenschmidt is a wonderful wrestler and I anticipate a hard struggle, but I am not picking the winner. I have my own opinion, but I refuse to be quoted as stating that I will surely beat Hackenschmidt, and all that sort of rot. "Any newspaper quoting me as saying I will beat Hackenschmidt or making public my plan of battle is 'faking.' The champion is permitting the public to pick its own winner. Gotch never bets on himself nor advises his friends to do so.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—George Hackenschmidt is no more the idol of English wrestling fans.

Time was when the Russian was considered unbeatable, but when he steps to the mat with Frank Gotch today he will not have the moral support of the game's followers over here, as he did when he met Gotch in Chicago in 1908.

The reason is that Hackenschmidt "ran out" of matches with Ahmud Bux and Karla, giant Hindoo mat artists. Failure to meet these men has caused the English sporting public to lose confidence in Hackenschmidt. The Hindoos will challenge the winner of the Gotch-Hack match this afternoon.
