A 96 1/2 Per Cent Perfect Baby HOW NEAR PERFECT IS YOURS?

MEASUREMENTS OF A PERFECT BABY.

AT BIRTH. Weight 7 1/2 lbs. Height 20 1/4 in. Chest 13 1/4 in. Head 10 in.

ONE YEAR. Weight 21 lbs. Height 29 in. Chest 18 in. Head 18 in.

TWO YEARS. Weight 26 1/2 lbs. Height 32 1/2 in. Chest 19 in. Head 19 in.

THREE YEARS. Weight 31 lbs. Height 35 in. Chest 20 in. Head 19 1/4 in. Skin should be pink, flesh firm, lips red, breath sweet, tongue clean. Should breathe through nose only. Should not be fretful. Should not be restlessly active, nor disinclined to play.

(In a health contest conducted at the state fair by the Iowa Congress of Mothers, Charles Elmer O'Toole of Des Moines, aged 30 months, was judged the healthiest and most nearly perfect baby in Iowa. Here is what his mother and one of the judges say about him:

THE MOTHER'S STORY. By Mrs. J. C. O'Toole. Our baby was sickly and delicate until he was seven months old. During this time I fed him on modified milk.

As soon as he was old enough to walk he was taken for daily airings out of doors, not in his baby cab, but a real walk where he was required to use his own little legs.

Every day he brushes his teeth carefully. He is our only child.

THE DOCTOR'S STORY. By Dr. Lena Meanes. This baby was given the prize because he came nearest to filling the requirements for a theoretically perfect child.

Now his daily diet consists of soft boiled eggs, toast, graham bread, milk, extremely well-cooked cereal and a little apple sauce or orange juice. He has never tasted meat, candy or sweets of any kind.

measurement 19 1/2 inches. The O'Toole baby secured 96 1/2 points. Two important facts usually determine the health of a child. (1) Was he fed regularly during the first year. (2) How many hours does he spend outdoors?

Personally, I think a baby should be kept outdoors about 23 1/2 out of the 24 hours. What to feed him? I would say to every mother, select the best doctor in the community. Follow his advice.

Many mothers dress their babies too warmly. keeping a pad between the first and second toes to relieve the pressure on the joint, and massaging with cooling lotion.

Dear Miss Grey: What will cure warts, and what will relieve cold sores?—J. T. A.: Nitric acid applied two or three times with a small feather or wooden toothpick will eat off the warts, but it is necessary to be very careful as the acid burns badly. Keep it out of the reach of children. Camphor or peroxide of hydrogen will, if applied during the early stages of a cold sore usually cure it.

Dear Miss Grey: 1.—What can I use to clean my mesh purse without removing the kid lining? 2.—How old should a girl be when married?—X. X. X. A.: 1.—If not badly soiled sometimes an immersion in flour, leaving it undisturbed for several days, will clean a mesh purse and lining. If badly soiled the only satisfactory method is removing the lining, cleaning it with naphtha (using precautions against fire), cleaning purse with ordinary silver polish or soaking it over night in sour milk, then putting back the lining. 2.—At least 20 or 22.

Dear Miss Grey: 1.—My finger nails are brittle and I have hangnails all around them. What will cure them? The half-moon does not show on them. What can I do? 2.—Please tell me what will stop the pain in bunions.—G. E. R. A.: 1.—Manicure the nails regularly and rub cold cream thoroughly into the skin around the nails every night. In drying the hands after washing them push back the cuticle at the base of the nails with the towel. This will help keep the "half-moon" in sight. 2.—Cure the bunions by wearing loose, comfortable shoes.

FASHIONS

NECK FIXINGS. The dainty fichu lately introduced has become more than popular.

Very deep sailor collars and cuffs of broderie anglaise, made severely plain and entirely unruffled, are the newest of accessories for sailor suits.

White chiffon collars with a hemstitched edge are one of the pleasing bits of neckwear. They are considered a trifle smarter than the collar of batiste and eyelet embroidery, although the latter are very good looking.

One of the very latest novelties from Paris is the frill jabot of pleated muslin, in which a pleated

piece of material about twelve inches long is caught together in the center with a strip of muslin and piped at the front of the lace collar, forming a semicircle or spreading fan-shaped jabot. Another new jabot which is very similar has the lower edges graduated by being cut obliquely. This is made of marquisette with insertions and edgings of Valenciennes or Cluny lace between which a hint of color is introduced.

MRS. V'S RECIPES

CITRON PRESERVE. Pare watermelon rind, cut all the pink part out, cut in small pieces and soak over night in water enough to cover it, adding a small piece of alum to the water. A piece as large as a nutmeg will be enough for five or six quarts of water. Pour water off in morning, rinse and put on stove with cold water to boil, but pour off and use cold water several times. Then boil till a fork will pierce the rind, and skim out the rind, adding sugar to as much of the last water as you wish; cut in thin slices, taking out seeds, and add to the water for juice. Boil to a sirup, put in the watermelon rind, and let simmer till clear, and then put up in cans, same as any fruit.

FRIED LIVER IN CRUMBS. The recipe comes from an old man who cooked in the lumber camps. Soak the liver (calf's or lamb's) in salted cold water 1/2 hour, drain on towel, cut into pieces, dip in beaten egg and crumbs or cornmeal, fry in hot pork fat. The secret is in soaking it in the cold salt water. It makes it tender and removes all strong flavor and any impurities that may exist. Hyde Park. Mrs. R.

SUMMER FRUIT CAKE. One cup sugar, 1/2 cup lard, 1 even teaspoonful cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoonful clove, a little nutmeg and salt, 1 teaspoon soda in 1 cup sour milk, 1 cup of raisins put through grinder and floured, 2 cups flour. Bake in a sheet 8x12. If do not frost this cake and we all like it and it is as cheap as any.

UNCOOKED PICKLES. 1 peck tomatoes chopped and steamed, chop 4 peppers, 6 large onions, 2 cups celery, 1 cup sugar 1/2 cup salt, 4 ounces mustard seed, 1 quart cold vinegar. A little horseradish root may be added.

BARTLETT PEARS PRESERVED WHOLE. One peck of pears ripe and hard, and two pounds of sugar. After done will make just four quart cans full. Peel the pears and put in cold water so they won't turn yellow. Put in your kettle two pounds of sugar, 1 1/2 cups water and let come to a good boil; then add your pears and let them come to a slow boil. Be careful and not break them. Cook until you find them soft by putting a fork in them. Take each one out carefully into your jars and fill full to top with the juice and pears and can hot. Set your cans upon the top and be sure they are air tight. While canning put in a fork and get out all air. Be sure your jars well sealed, also the covers. Put them on in a boiler of cold water and let them come to a boil, and put the fruit into the hot jars. I never have any spoil, but am very careful that my jars are all right. I cover them while cooking to keep all the flavor I can of the fruit. Mine were about two hours, cooking very slowly. Don't cook them until red.

GRAPES CANNED WHOLE. Pick the grapes from clusters. Heat jar very hot; fill it with

whole grapes shaking them down well. Now fill the jars with boiling water. Put on covers, let stand 10 minutes, then pour off water and fill with boiling sirup made sweet to taste, and seal hot. The skins will not break and they have a very different flavor from grape sauce.

SWEET PRESERVE. To one pound of fruit use three-quarters of a pound of granulated sugar. Allow one lemon, sliced and seeded, to two pounds of fruit. Put the sugar on with just water enough to melt it, add the fruit and lemon and cook gently until tender and transparent, then can. This can be made of pears, green tomatoes, watermelon rinds or other kinds of fruit. If pears are used, put in a little water, as the pears are not juicy like tomatoes. A little preserved ginger root cut in small pieces and put in with the fruit and lemon is nice, especially with pears. My favorite is to use green tomatoes, sliced and quartered.

IMITATION PRESERVED GINGER. Three pounds squash (weighed after peeling), 3 pounds white sugar, 1 ounce ginger (ground), rind 6, juice of 2 lemons. Peel the squash. Take out the seeds and slice into pieces about an inch thick and two inches long, or cup up according to your own fancy. Strain the lemon juice, and grate the rind quite fine; add the sugar and ginger. Put all together in pan and boil until clear, about an hour. Be very careful to watch it does not burn. Keep airtight, as other preserves.


