## Beattie Conviction Was Great Victory

DETROIT, Sept. 13.—The conviction of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., for the murder of his wife marks a new epoch in American jurisprudence, says Judge J. W. Donovan of Detroit. "American juries have been prone to deal lightly with this class of men for many years," he said. "I do not hesitate to say that it has been the weakest spot in our judicial procedure. I believe this case reflects the awakening of the national conscience. The nation had to awaken to the dangers which lurked in the wake of such a crime, and the Beattie case proved the turning point. From now on we will see fewer crimes of this nature."

## BIG STRIKE IN SPAIN

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BALBOA, Spain, Sept. 12.—Owing to the seriousness of the strike here, a state of siege has been proclaimed and 5,000 troops are coming. The street railways have stopped, business houses closed their doors and commercial activities are at a standstill. Strikers and troops have clashed numbers of times and the troops have fired into the mobs. In one encounter two rioters were killed. A railroad bridge near Oviedo was dynamited by striking coal miners.

## Ida May Gives Child to Husband, Will be Actress

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Sept. 12.—Mrs. Ida May Henry is speeding toward San Francisco today, intent upon entering upon a career as a vaudeville actress. An affecting scene marked her parting with her two children, for whose possession she has made a sensational fight since her husband, a local bank clerk, divorced her last winter. When Mrs. Henry in a room at a hotel turned the children over to her former husband Henry broke down and wept but the pretty young wife was calm.

## Ex-King Manuel Is Busted Owes Just Ten Millions

LONDON, Sept. 13.—Ex-King Manuel of Portugal is today living on charity. Completely stripped, he is dependent on his mother, ex-Queen Amelia, and his uncle, the Duc d'Orleans. His mother has a small income. The Duc d'Orleans is wealthy, but notoriously close-fisted. The \$10,000,000 debts of his father, King Carlos, are responsible, and the republic recently stopped his allowance of \$3,200 a month.

## Darnell to Go to St. Louis for Prisoner

After a search which he began immediately after the promotion to be captain of detectives, J. E. Darnell has at last run down Clarence Rush, wanted for complicity in the 2 street car hold-up of August 3, 1908. Through a letter in the hands of former Chief Duley, Darnell learned of the whereabouts of a friend of Rush, and later by writing and sending pictures located him in jail at St. Louis. Darnell will get extradition papers and start immediately for St. Louis.

The holdup resulted in the killing of Motorman Brown, who was shot by James Keely, now serving a term at Walla Walla.

PEKIN, Sept. 13.—"Destroy the rebels to the last man." With this order today, the Chinese troops are en route for the Sze Chuen province. Many of those taking part in the disturbance are reported to be in ignorance of the real meaning of their actions.

## Works Says Taft Is Ruled By Interests

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 13.—Asserting that the republican party is now facing the biggest crisis in its history, Senator John D. Works, progressive republican, today charges that President Taft is essentially a reactionary and a representative of "the interests." "Taft," he said, "is dominated entirely by the machine. He in no way represents the wishes of the people." "We have two candidates—Taft and Senator Robert M. LaFollette. LaFollette has fought long for the principles of all progressive republicans. There probably is no other man whom the great majority of republicans would rather have elected to the office of president. But it is doubtful if LaFollette will be nominated against the machine. "Therefore, I urge that all republicans stand by their party a little longer with the assurance that in four years we shall be able to wrest it from the interests and put it again in control of the people."

## Another Flyer On Cross Country Trip

(By United Press Leased Wire.) EAST ORANGE, N. J., Sept. 14.—After flying 25 miles in his second attempt today Aviator Ward again lost his sense of direction and descended here. He hopes to re-ascend before night.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—James J. Ward, the youngest aviator in America, set out today across the continent to beat Robert G. Fowler for a \$50,000 newspaper prize, but was forced to descend in the east of New Jersey after 22 miles.

He ascended from Governor's island at 9:10 o'clock, flying in a biplane. He planned to make Buffalo by night.

General Fred D. Grant waved flag for the signal to ascend. Ward rose 500 feet and sailed up the Hudson, then westward across New Jersey. He was seen to zig-zag over the eastern part of New Jersey as though having engine trouble.

Leaving Newark, N. J., Ward followed the Lehigh Valley tracks and disappeared toward Phillipsburg in the west. He landed at Ashbrook, 22 miles from here.

## PROSECUTOR MAKES M'MANIGAL REHEARSE TESTIMONY DAILY

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 13.—In rehearsal of the testimony he is to give at the McNamara trial is being practiced daily by Ortie E. McManigal. Judge Walter Bordwell said today that the trial would probably begin October 11, even though postponements would be necessary owing to legal holidays.

## Dr. Hazzard May Get Off

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PORT ORCHARD, Sept. 13.—Dr. Linda Burfield Hazzard, the fast cure specialist, may never have to stand trial on the charge of murder in the first degree for the death of Miss Claire Williamson, an Englishwoman who took her treatment. A demurrer to the information filed by the state was sustained by Judge Myers because the character and quantity of food withheld from the deceased and the lack of which is said to have caused the death was not specifically described. Prosecutor Stevenson frankly admits the difficulty of making so specific a description.

## RUDKIN TAKES SHOT AT OLYMPIA

Jury men were lining up before Judge Rudkin in federal court room to "get excused." One had a sick wife, another was ill himself, a third had stock to look after and no one to tend to it, one was deaf and finally came a merchant from Olympia. "Your honor, I am in business in Olympia and there is no one to look after it but my brother, who is sick," pleaded the merchant. Judge Rudkin has just left after years residence in Olympia. "A sick man can run a business in Olympia all right, we can't excuse you," said the court, smiling.

Dissatisfaction with hours and wages are the reasons. The manufacturers have offered a 52-hour week, but the union insists on 50 hours.


