First Seattle Woman Juror

SEATTLE, Oct. 16.—Mrs. Emma Frazier, wife of a contractor, the first woman in Seattle to serve on a criminal jury. She took a leading part in the discussions in the jury room with her 11 male co-jurors, over the guilt or innocence of Joseph Rose, charged with burglary.
 "Are women influenced entirely by sympathy?" Mrs. Frazier denies this, at least so far as it applies to criminal cases where the guilt of the accused person is apparent.
 Here was a young man, 17 years old, charged with a penitentiary offense. But to Mrs. Frazier there was no doubt that he had committed the crime.
 So, while she sympathized with him on account of his youth, she did not shirk her duty, and the verdict returned in Judge Main's court was unanimous.
 "Guilty as charged," it read.

IS YOUR DAUGHTER TAKING MUSIC LESSONS?

NINETY-NINE OUT OF EVERY 100 TEACHERS ARE INCOMPETENT, SAYS FRANK DAMROSCH, DIRECTOR OF NEW YORK INSTITUTE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Is your daughter taking voice or piano lessons? Do you know the chances are nine to one that the instruction she is getting is worse than useless?


"This, at any rate, is the assertion of Frank Damrosch, director of the New York Institute of Musical Art.

"The ignorance of the public in musical matters makes it possible for the great throng of music teachers to get a living," said Damrosch. "Ninety-nine per cent of these teachers are totally incompetent. The majority of them do not have even a rudimentary knowledge of music."

"After these individuals have learned to play a few pieces after a fashion, or can do a trill with their voices, they start to teach as a pleasant way of earning a livelihood. The result is that their pupils make more noise than music. People drum instead of playing the piano and yell instead of sing. They have no idea of touch, phrasing or expression.

"The American public pays an enormous sum annually for this wretched instruction. A course of lessons usually lasts about three years. Then, if the pupil is ambitious and goes to a competent teacher, it takes three years to unlearn the false instruction before any real development can begin."

The Institute of Musical Art is not conducted for profit, but exists on an endowment fund of \$500,000 given by James Loom, millionaire New York banker.

Chains and Spies Have No Place In Married Life Born of True Love

"Don't live in each other's pockets," is a pretty good suggestion to follow in regard to the problem of "how to be happy, though married."
 Personal liberty is dear to every human being; it is an inalienable right. And where marriage curtails this, to the point of imposing fetters that gall and fret the individual soul, marriage is a failure.
 Love is the only chain that human nature will endure. But that is because love's slavery is voluntary, self-giving, joyous. When a great, mutual love is lacking between husband and wife, or when its first glory begins to fade, then do the iron gyves of the marriage bond begin to bite into the soul of one or the other, or both.
 Surely, there would be less misery if young couples would agree upon greater personal liberty for each, at the very outset of their married lives; if the wife would not insist upon her husband's giving an account of his every move; if the husband would not

demand to know how his wife spent every quarter he gave her.
 A few husbands, but many more wives, have a horrible habit of keeping track of their married partners, at every hour of the day and night. Many an unfortunate man dares not leave his office, for a short time, without phoning his wife just where he is going, and why and with whom. A man will call up his wife half a dozen times a day to ask what she is doing, where she is going, and when she will get home.
 Such shackles, once forged, are hard to break. But even if force is necessary, they ought to be broken, and a mutual, personal freedom established, if there is to be any degree of self-respect and pleasant comradeship in the marriage relation. The best plan, however, is not to fall into the fatal error, in the beginning. Slavery is a crime.
