# Poindexter Strong For People's Coal

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Oct. 18.—"I return from Alaska more firmly convinced than ever that the government should build a railroad and open coal mines, primarily for supplying the government's needs on the coast, and, secondly for furnishing coal at reasonable cost to consumers."

This was the declaration made to the United Press today by Senator Miles Poindexter, who arrived with Gifford Pinchot from Alaska yesterday.

Poindexter stated that he was prepared to fight for the passage of his bill, introduced at the special session, which provides for government ownership of Alaska coal mines and government ownership of transportation facilities.

Commends Controller Bay. In speaking of Controller Bay, Poindexter said that with the expenditure of a moderate sum of money a good harbor could be established there.

Poindexter is enthusiastic about Alaska resources.

"The timber is of immense value," he said. "There are twelve saw mills in Southeastern Alaska, cutting 20,000,000 feet a year, and in addition, there are some 20,000,000 feet of piling taken annually. It is the greatest paper pulp forest in the world."

"While perhaps some people have exaggerated the amount of coal in Alaska, there are without doubt immense measures of coal in the Matanuska and the Bering river districts.

"In the Yakotega district there are extensive measures of coal of great value. This Yakotega district, as well as the Bering river district is within the easy reach

# Hillman Men Declared In Contempt of Court

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 18.—For writing letters to Judge Morrow, Gilbert, Wolvorton and Ross of the United States circuit court of appeals asking leniency for Clarence D. Hillman, Seattle real estate man, whose appeal from the conviction and judgment in Seattle in 1910 of two and a half years at McNeil's island and a fine of \$5,200 on an indictment charging the use of the mails to promote fraudulent land schemes is

pending, Hillman, E. F. Bateman and B. H. Cook were adjudged guilty of contempt today by the court, Judges Gilbert, Wolvorton and Ross sitting en banc.

Hillman who prompted Bateman and Cook to write the letters, was sentenced to a fine of \$1,000; Bateman, \$200, and Cook \$25, with an alternative of confinement in the county jail in King county, Wash.

Hillman was in court with his wife and children.

# CITY TO BRING PERKINS TO TIME

An ordinance was introduced and the council is holding a special session this afternoon to pass it providing for the establishing of a new grade and condemnation of rights of S. A. Perkins and the Weyerhaeuser interests in the old grade of Eleventh street.

The spur track on Cliff avenue in the rear of the Perkins building will be taken out and if the Weyerhaeuser interests make any trouble they will get an order from the council to remove their building from the street. It extends now five inches in the street.

It is said the Perkins block is one inch in the street. It too will have to move if the city is to be held up and improvements stopped, or damages demanded.

# Brings Prisoner From St. Louis

Marzycky is declared to have been seen prowling around the Showman home on the afternoon preceding the murder, and he is said to have several times been heard to threaten the family.
