MRS. V'S RECIPES

STUFFED PEPPERS.

Dear Readers—I will tell you how I stuffed peppers for a good many years. Have just finished a peck, and they will be fine this winter: One peck of green peppers, one good-sized head of cabbage, four medium-sized onions, one teaspoon cassia, one teaspoon of clove (ground), one-half teaspoon ground mustard. Chop the cabbage and onions quite fine. Mix well with the spices. Cut the tops of the peppers almost off, remove all seeds. Cover with cold water and a teaspoon of salt. Soak over night. In the morning drain and fill the pods with the stuffing. Tie the tops on securely, pack in a stone jar and cover with boiling vinegar. Put a teaspoon of celery seed in a bag and place in the jar. Can omit that if you do not care for celery. Keep jar well covered.

PICKLED CAULIFLOWER.

Break the heads into small pieces and boil 10 minutes in salt and water—water to cover and 1-4 cup salt. Drain carefully. When cold place in jar and pour over hot vinegar to cover. If you wish for whole use whole heads and allspice. If you put it up in white vinegar in glass jars it looks tempting.

Cynthia Grey's Letters

Dear Miss Grey: What will remove lemon soda stains from a green silk parasol? BETTY B. A.—If the color is taken out, which I strongly suspect, there is no help but recourse to water-color paints.

Dear Miss Grey: (1) What will remove mildew from blue gingham? (2) Grass stains from white linen? (3) Iron rust from white tablecloth? (4) Axle grease from natural linen? (5) What will set the color in light blue piping on white linen waist? RUBY. A.—(1) Chloride of lime solution will remove the mildew, the grass stains and the iron rust, but it will also take the color from the gingham. Boil a pound of soda in a gallon of water for ten minutes, and then add a pound of chloride of lime. When the fluid is settled the clear part should be bottled and corked tightly, and kept for use when stains cannot be removed with soap and water. Lard, well rubbed in and left for a day or two, will remove the fat stains. Wash in warm suds. Soak the blue-trimmed waist in a solution of 1/2 gallon cold water and one ounce powdered alum. Let dry, then wash in the usual way.
