Mandy's Gay Calico Dress Cost Just 98 Cents; 61 Cents of it Went to Aid "Patriotic" Trust How \$32,000,000 a Year Is Wasted Shipping Raw Cotton to England and Calico Back to the United States.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 16.—Nine southern governors—and Mandy! Nine soft-voiced southern gentlemen gathered here to see if they couldn't devise a way of raising the price of cotton—and Mandy, 300 miles away, black by nature, happy by the same, busily picking the cotton itself.

The price of cotton is a big question for the governors, but Mandy is much more concerned in getting enough for her and her pickaninnies to eat and calico clothes to wear.

Let's visit with Mandy as she picks the raw cotton—the same kind that went to make the calico dress which surrounds her generous frame.

That's the problem the governors ought to take up. But they don't.

"There's 14 yards of cloth in this dress," says Mandy, "and I paid 7 cents a yard for the cloth. That's 98 cents."

It took two pounds of cotton to make Mandy's dress. Mandy got about a cent for picking the two pounds. The farmer got about 16 cents for it. It cost the manufacturer and merchant 20 cents to get the two pounds of cotton into Mandy's black hands, ready for sewing.

That accounts for 37 cents of the 98 cents which Mandy paid for the cloth.

Where did the other 61 cents go. Who got it?

"That's the big question that is most important. But the governors wouldn't discuss it. What the governors wanted was to raise the price of cotton 3 cents per pound and put \$650,000,000 into the pockets of southern farmers.

Why don't the governors strike at the big evil—at the forces of Big Business, politics and high tariff that took 61 cents out of Mandy's 98 cents, and that holds up every wearer of cotton in the United States in the same way?

But part of the money goes to American mill hands, some one may say.

Only a very small part. Most of the wages paid, goes to ENGLISH mill hands! The "patriotic" cotton trust, after it buys the cotton, ships most of it to England where, every year, half a million cheaply paid English mill hands

weave it into cotton goods! And these cotton goods are shipped back to the United States! The mill hands of the United States, who were out of work because the cotton was shipped to England, and who have only enough money to buy cotton clothes for themselves, must pay extra every year, the \$32,000,000 which the railroad and steamship companies get every year for shipping the cotton to England and shipping the woven calico back to the United States.

Why not have an export duty on raw cotton, instead of an import duty?

Why do we allow the cotton trust to send its work to foreign countries? But the governors didn't talk about that at New Orleans.


