(By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Making an additional statement to what she had said earlier today, Beulah Binford said: Changed Her Name. Under a fictitious name Miss Binford is living with the family of Isador Bernstein, under the eye of Rev. Madison Peters. On being asked other questions, she said: "For God's sake, let me alone. I know nothing about the case. Don't drag me down again. Beulah Binford is dead. I have a chance to save myself, I have a good position and a good home and I want to be left alone. The only real friends I ever made are taking care of me. "I was the victim in the Beattie case. They picked me out of a dozen others. I was Beattie's cast-off. If they would have taken his other victims there would have been scandal. I pity Beattie, but he did nothing good for me, and he turned me away when he was tired of me. I forgive him, though, and I only pray that the past be blotted out. "I leave town at noon today to return tomorrow night. I want to be away when Beattie dies."
