

## TRAINING FOR A MARATHON

(Johnny Hayes, the plucky American boy who won the Olympic marathon race in England in 1908, realizing his life ambition, knows what it means to prepare for one of these gruelling contests. He tells the boys and young men of Tacoma what to do to fit the body for long distance running, in his article today, so that they, too, may become marathoners.—Editor.)

Brains, good lungs, a stout heart, will power and grit—these are necessary for anyone who wants to be a distance runner. The first thing to do is to acquire good habits. Don't smoke, don't drink—these dwarf your lung power. Get as much sleep as possible.

Different runners have different running styles, but the way I have found most successful in long races is to use rubber heels, landing on the ball of my foot and letting the heel hit the ground a fraction of a second afterward. Never set the pace—let the other fellow do it. It's always easier to come up from behind than it is to fight desperately to hold the lead, knowing others are tearing along behind you.

Never strain your muscles. Run easy—let your body swing with your stride and you won't find any strain. And never, under any circumstances, run on your toes. It makes sore feet and uses up the power.

Those who want to learn to be distance runners should ascertain from an experienced trainer whether they require much training or not. And they should live up to the rules laid down by a trainer or coach.

PEARY GETS MEDAL.


