BURY EVANS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 5.—With President Taft, Admiral George Dewey, Lieutenant General Nelson A. Miles and practically the entire cabinet, diplomatic corps, representing all foreign countries attending the funeral of Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans was held here this afternoon. More than 1,000 men, representing the army and navy, escorted the body to Arlington cemetery, and there lined up and presented arms and "taps" was sounded over the grave. Immediately thereafter a salute of 13 guns was fired.
