

# Panama Canal and Labor on Pacific Coast

What's to Be Done With the Big Influx of Cheap Labor, is the Problem That Western Empire Must Some Day Solve.

 Perhaps you have thought of homesteads, squatters' rights and desert land grants, etc., in connection with peering the plow of the immigrant to the wilderness of mesquite, cactus and sage brush. Dismiss the dream, for THE UNNATURALIZED FOREIGNER IS BARRED FROM ALL HOMESTEAD PRIVILEGES IN PUBLIC LANDS.

So the immigrant can farm in but two ways. First, independently. Now, in small lots, the cheapest arable land in Southern California is about \$300 an acre. That means the bare dirt and water; neither dwelling, fence, draught animal, outbuildings, implements, tools, household furniture or furnishings, trees, shrubs, slips, plants or seeds. Improved property, say a young grove, will range to \$2000 an acre. In fact, from a dozen oranges on a fruit stand to a whole orchard, everything in California is so much "and up," and this "and up" is all talk even seems to be in stock. Five acres is regarded by practical farmers as about as small a plot as even intensive cultivation can do with, if the living is to be made wholly from the land. We exclude the gentleman farmer, the suburbanite, the commuter and the thrifty housewife—with whom a garden

"Just as soon as the canal is opened the big employers of labor will be able to solve this problem of many years' standing and by the importation of unprejudiced labor handle the labor market in such a way as to clear the whole atmosphere," says G. W. Luce of San Francisco, one of the chiefs of the Southern Pacific staff. "This is not a fight, but simply an adjustment and will be along natural lines. California offers the finest and perhaps the only land for intensive farming today. Most of this land is along our lines. Ships will land Italians and other Europeans directly at San Francisco. They will go on this land. The result is so far-reaching that even prominent business men of the Pacific Coast have failed to realize its importance."—New York Times.

or some chickens constitute a diversion and whose naive views of what they "make" takes into account nothing of what they had to invest before they "made" it. Nor will we for the moment be swayed by the airy real estate agent who sells and re-sells the same tract to a procession of deluded mortals, getting his commission "a-coming" and "a-going." But say three acres, giving some ground for the family garden and the balance for the money crop which may take from one to any number of years to develop. Nearly \$1000 for the place, several hundred dollars more for the first year's indispensables and certainly an equal sum for food and necessities of life. The Eastern farmer who expects to make California pay, learns that he must invest \$5000 to \$10,000 then patiently learn new ways and marketing conditions and trust for returns when his vineyards or fruit trees begin to bear. Of course, there is cheaper land in California and all through the west, per acre, provided one buys great

tracts, or gets the arid land. But without water the ground is worthless except for long speculative purposes.

Nor can the whole family work on the farm. Children under 16 must go to school during the term. After 16, the boys may work as long as their father likes, but no female can do other than domestic work or fruit preserving, in season, or prosecution of her individual business, for more than eight hours a day. These laws are rigidly enforced. The wife alone, as half owner of the community property, assumed to be equally interested with her husband in their business, could slave as she does in Europe. That universal privilege of wifehood is still inviolate.

Are these immigrants, then, to come as independent husbandmen? If so, they must have tucked in their vest pockets passage money, entrance fee, transportation from dock to inland points and one or two thousand dollars to start in with.

Or, these immigrants are coming for the time honored reasons: to fill empty stomachs and empty pockets. No matter how desirable they may be as ultimate farmers, they must first find employment by which to exist and eventually to save enough to buy lands, which ever increase in value and become harder to obtain.

Or, Big Business can herd these helpless immigrants in shacks up on vast acres for the double purpose of re-organizing the farm upon the lines of other great industries; and, from the very fecundity of these transplanted peasants insure abundant "unprejudiced" labor for the factories which will whirl with the business of supplying the Orient with steel rails and clothing and oil and canned goods and all other stuffs. Mills and ranches will move to the same time and measure—higher protective tariffs, lower wages, greater profits for the overlords—and beautiful California will become one gigantic, weltering, hopeless, helpless, European slum.
