


Friendly Test Case For the Boxing Law

With the city attorney declaring the law prohibits a boxing match or sparring exhibition before and among members of the club and saying it is really an evasion of the law, and attorneys for the Young Men's Athletic club declaring the Leon-Martin match would not be a violation, it is probable that the law will be tested out in courts. Mark Shaughnessy says he has no intention of staging the exhibition in Tacoma but he believes that the club attorneys know as much about the law as the city attorneys. He says he will not oppose the wishes of the city or county officials but that it is probable the law may be taken into court on a friendly test case in the near future. This will not interfere with holding the exhibition before the club in a more friendly neighborhood. As a result of the attorney's advice and in the probability of the test case, Shaughnessy is busy trying to get a suitable club house. This will include gymnasium, reading room, jinks room, pool and billiards and other general club necessities.

CHICAGO, Jan. 17.—After declaring war on the metropolis, pugilistically, Jack Johnson, heavyweight champion, today has changed his mind and declares he intends to leave for New York soon to sign for a match there with either Carl Morris or A. The negro made this announcement, despite the fact that Chairman O'Neil of the New York boxing commission has stated that Johnson would not be permitted to engage in any bouts in New York state.

BASE BALL ANECDOTES BY BILLY EVANS

Spit ball pitchers are the exception. Five years ago practically every pitcher dabbled with the slop ball. Last year major league teams had more than one spit ball artist. Not long ago when a minor league pitcher was secured the thing given consideration was his spit ball. Now the average manager frowns on the youngster who depends on the delivery. Why this decline? Some say the pitchers discovered that the use of the spitter shortened their careers. Others that it was because pitchers found it hard to control. My belief is the decline is due to the batsmen "waiting out" the pitchers who use the spitter. When the spit ball came into use it was considered unhitatable. When they went to the bat, players swung wildly, hoping to connect. As a rule they hit over the ball. Players say the spit ball of the average pitcher is not hard to hit providing he breaks the ball high. The difficult spitter breaks at the knee. 
