

# Andrew Jackson Would Be a Muckraker Today Says His Biographer

(By United Press Leased Wire.) NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Jan. 23.—"If Andrew Jackson were on earth today he would, I believe, be a muckraker."

This is the statement of Prof. John Spencer Bassett, the most recent biographer of the former president.

"If Andrew Jackson should come back to earth," his biographer was asked, "what would he do; where would he stand?"

"Jackson's keenest impulse," he replied, "was against political jobbery and he would be in sympathy with the present-day muckraker. He opposed the United States Bank because the men behind it were to profit from its liberal charter. He did not ask what service the bank would render, but what it would make out of the common man."

After the contest Miss Close married Elwin Neame, the photographer who had taken the photographs of her for The Daily Mail. Recently Mrs. Neame became the mother of a bouncing baby boy. He is a very good looking youngster and takes after his mother. In particular, he has her mouth, admiring family critics say. He weighed nine and a half pounds at birth, and is gaining right along. His name is Ronald.
