Dear Miss Grey: Please tell me where the government land offices of Oregon are located. How long will a soldier who has served one year in the army have to serve on a claim in order to prove up?
 INQUIRY.

A.—Address U. S. Land Office, Federal Bldg., Portland, Ore. Residence and cultivation must begin within six months from time of filing, regardless of time when they make entry under such statement. But if they make entry without filing declaratory statement they must begin their residence within six months from date of such entry, and improvement and annual cultivation for at least one year must begin in earnest, but after that the soldier is entitled to credit on the remainder of the five-year period for the terms of his actual service; or if he has been discharged on account of wounds, or disabilities incurred in service, he is entitled to full term.

Dear Miss Grey: Will you please tell me what will reduce the veins on the backs of the hands? Also will high-waist effects be worn this season?

Simple, Becoming Styles for Dressing Daughter's Hair



Daughter's hair is frequently a problem. When a girl is at the awkward age, no longer a little girl and yet is not a grown-up, it is hard to know what to do with her crown of glory.

A graceful hair-dressing for the lassie who is in the schoolroom is braids wound about the head. The hair must be soft thick and fluffy to be arranged in this simple, girlish fashion.

The mode of doing this coiffure is to part the hair in the center of the forehead and carry the part to the nape of the neck. Then roll the hair back softly from the ear and pin it securely. Braid the hair in two plaits and twist them about the head. A little fringe over the forehead is becoming with this hair dressing.

For the girl in her first teens or those about 10 and 12 the hair is waved and left unbraided. The front locks are tied with a broad ribbon bow at the crown of the head and the ends fall loosely down the back. Midway the hair is tied with another ribbon.

It is difficult to make the wee girl's hair look pretty when it is at the betwixt and between period. When it is at this ugly length too short to curl or braid, an attractive arrangement is to tie the short ends on either side of the parting with ribbon rosettes. A band of the same ribbon goes from one choux to the other and appears to hold the part well down.
