

# GET READY FOR RIOT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LONDON, Feb. 7.—Disregarding advice of friends, Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, started today for Belfast, where he is scheduled to speak tomorrow in behalf of home rule for Ireland. Churchill's mother did not accompany him as had been announced, as it was feared the excitement would adversely affect her.

Rioting is almost certain to follow any attempt by Churchill to speak in the city. Recognizing the seriousness of the situation, Belfast authorities have taken the most rigorous police precautions to prevent a demonstration, but it is not believed they will be able to cope with the 30,000 Ulsterites who will be on the scene armed with clubs to take action in the event of the speakers attempting to carry out their program.

Churchill has no fear of molestation and believes it his duty to carry out his original program.

BELFAST, Feb. 7.—"Our organization is sufficient to enable us to keep this arch traitor from defiling our historic city." This was the statement made today to the United Press by Captain J. Craig, M. C. H., member of the Ulster unionist council.

Belfast seriously apprehends bloodshed. Tradesmen are boarding up windows and barricading doors.

# TRAIN IS ROBBED

(By United Press Leased Wire.) MEMPHIS, Tenn., Feb. 7.—Seven bandits today held up Rock Island train No. 43, westbound, two miles out of Hulbert, but secured only one package of registered mail, after making two futile attempts to dynamite the safe in the express car.

The explosion was so heavy that it shook houses along the river front in Memphis. It is the second holdup at the same spot within two months.

Mail Clerk H. M. Beadle escaped from the car and ran two miles to Hulbert to give the alarm. He held two bandits boarded the train near Hulbert and the others boarded it a moment later.

The robbers cut the wires of the Arkansas side of the river. Posses are in pursuit.

# Hay to Open Food Show

The food exposition in Gipsy Smith tabernacle is on tonight. Governor Hay will be there to give it a sendoff. There will be music and vaudeville and 400 pretty girls demonstrating foods and filling up the citizens with "samples."

# GUNMAN KILLED BY SHERIFF

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SILVER LAKE, Ore., Feb. 7.—The body of C. E. Shaffer, gunman, who was killed in a duel with three deputy sheriffs who had gone into the woods to arrest him for wounding Charles Smith, was brought here today, where an inquest will be held.

After wounding Smith, Shaffer fled. He was pursued by Deputies C. D. Reeder, C. W. Jones and K. O. Chick. When ordered to surrender Shaffer opened fire. A number of shots were exchanged before the gunman was shot and instantly killed, a bullet penetrating his chest.

# Burglar Was Not Hungry

William Vincent, the youth who was shot while attempting to escape from the marshal at Roy after he had burglarized the store of Nelson Murray, was sentenced by Superior Judge Chapman to from one to fifteen years in the state reformatory. It was proven that Vincent did not break into the store for the purpose of obtaining food but that he changed his shoes while in the store, took a new hat and robbed the cash register. No provisions in the store were in any way disturbed.

Steve Sekulich was sentenced to spend three months in the county jail for stealing a \$45 watch from J. W. Johnson.

# Charter Amendments Broached By League

The Central Improvement League this morning submitted a letter to the council asking that the people be given a chance to vote on charter amendments as follows:

To elect the city attorney.

To have the city engineer appointed by the whole council.

To permit the city to sell water and light outside the corporate limits.

To provide that employees under civil service who are discharged and who demand a hearing shall have it before the civil service board instead of the commissioner over him.

The council laid the matter over for further consideration. Many other charter amendments have also been suggested and if any are submitted probably others will be put in the list and the whole charter fixed up.

Judge Stiles called the attention of the council to the fact that if the people really wanted charter changes they could secure them by a petition of 15 per cent of the voters, the council then being compelled to submit the question.

# CAPTURE ARMED MEXICANS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7.—Thirteen armed Mexicans were captured on the American side of the border today by a troop of American cavalry, according to advices received by the war department today from Col. Steever, in command of the United States troops stationed at El Paso. The Mexicans were captured 38 miles northeast of El Paso. It has not yet been determined what disposition will be made of the prisoners. Despite statements from General Orozco that he has no intention of starting a movement in Chihuahua to cause that state to secede from Mexico the war department today is keeping close tabs on the Mexican chief. Department officials admit that General Orozco has a large following in Chihuahua and declare that any rising headed by him would undoubtedly assume serious proportions.

EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 7.—Denying disloyalty to the federal government and denying the state of Chihuahua is not on the verge of secession from the Mexican government, General Pascual Orozco today issued the following statement:

"I wish emphatically to deny reports published as to the cessation of Chihuahua and my disloyalty to the Madero government."

EL PASO, Tex.—Two suspects are under arrest here today for the murder of Mrs. Bettie Potter of Silver City, N. M. Her head was crushed with a stone.

NEW YORK—John B. Doris, a prominent theatrical manager, circus man and politician, is dead at his home here today.

# WOMEN SLAM ROOSEVELT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7.—Sarcastic flings at Colonel Roosevelt and the declaration that he could hardly be considered "an important addition to our ranks," marked the formal launching of the campaign for equal suffrage in Oregon, at a meeting of the Portland Equal Suffrage league last night.

In the presence of 200 persons, Mrs. Helen Hay Greeley, lawyer and representative of the New York Equal Suffrage league, attacked Roosevelt's recent editorial in the Outlook, in which he declares for woman suffrage. She said:

"The Great Oomf of the Outlook has flopped again. He did it by means of a six-page editorial. We do not, however, regard him as an important addition to our ranks. The editorial is superficial and it is sloppy. One does not have to read more than three pages to see just how sloppy it is."

# Could Not Find Mothers Body

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SAN DIEGO, Feb. 7.—The story of George W. Patterson, contestant in the Thurston will suit and son of Mrs. Harriet Patterson Thurston, who left the bulk of her fortune to Mrs. Katherine Tingley, leader of the Theosophical society, is today a part of the evidence submitted to the jury.

Patterson revealed the most intimate details of his family while he was on the stand. Only when he told of his mother's death did he show any emotion. Lowering his voice, he told of receiving a telegram two days after her death signed "LW," and of his long search for the crematory in Hoboken where the remains had been taken.

He told the jury of his frantic experience in calling on the undertaker after undertaker in the hope of finding his mother's body, and how he finally discovered it was Dr. Lorin Wood of the Theosophical society had sent the telegram two days after Mrs. Thurston died. What happened in the crematory after he had found the body was barred by Judge Guy.

# Manuel Training At Fife School

The little suburb of Fife is awake. The school board last night voted to buy an additional acre, making 3 1/2 acres in the school lot, then awarded a contract to Contractor Eispinger to erect a \$4,500 building for domestic science and manual training with a great auditorium above for improvement club and civic center meetings.

The board also voted for free text books, and will add a ninth grade to start a high school.

The orchard will accompany the pretty Colorado girl to the show. Miss Wade is the daughter of a wealthy orchardist of Paonia, Colo., and is 17 years smilingly young.


