WILL NOT APOLOGIZE BORROWER IS JAILED

C., Feb. 9.—Declaration that he and his associates would rather go to jail than apologize for their stand in the contempt case growing out of the publication of a "We don't patronize" list in the Federationist was made today by Samuel Gompers president of the American Federation of Labor. When Gompers was cross-examined by the three attorneys appointed by District Judge Wright he said: "You humiliate and insult me." "We would rather spend the remainder of our lives in jail than offer apology for our action in the Bucks Stove & Range case." LEAD BORROWER

ORCHARD VICTIMS PLAN RETALIATION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 9.—Declaring that they were swindled and determined to recover as much property as possible from the defunct Columbia River Orchard company and bring proceedings against any officials of the wrecked bubble whom they believed to be culpable, holders of \$350,000 bonds in the shattered concern have banded together here and engaged attorneys to make a fight.

A meeting of the bondholders will be held in a day or so for the purpose of mapping out a plan for action.

The Oregon organization will represent \$750,000 of the bonds when action is finally taken.

KING AS A RESCUER

MADRID, Feb. 9.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria started today for the scene of the big floods in the southwestern part of the empire, where scores of persons have perished and thousands of acres of land are inundated. The king plans personally to supervise the work of rescue and relief.

The Manazares river is badly swollen. The Andalusian valleys are flooded, the populace is in a panic, the Seville electric light plant is out of operation and the city is in darkness.

Two trains on the Cadiz line are caught in the flood. A boat bound for L. Algaba has capsized.

FORTRESS IS SHELLED
