Has Underwood Smothered Proposed Investigation of the Money Trust?

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—The proposal to investigate the money trust has split the democrats in the house of representatives wide open.

The Progressive Democrats say investigate. The Standpat Democrats say don't.

Congressman Robert L. Henry of Texas, chairman of the committee on rules, is leading the progressive element in the fight for an investigation. Oscar W. Underwood is leading the other wing.

It is the same kind of a fight that has split the republican party. The money trust investigation is the immediate provocation. It is part of the war between progress and reaction.

William J. Bryan has added his voice urging the adoption of the resolutions providing for the money trust inquiry. Henry declares emphatically: "There should be no pussyfooting or

gumshoeing performances by the trustees of the people now holding seats in congress."

Henry demands a democratic caucus with a record vote.

This resolution, by Lindberg of Minnesota, has been before the house rules committee since this session began—six weeks. There have been hearings and arguments in full. Practically all members who are free of special privilege want the inquiry; but it doesn't go forward.

Oscar W. Underwood, leader of the reactionary element, is a strong man and his following is powerful. Underwood has declared frankly his opposition. He says there are enough inquiries going on and besides he thinks the tariff is a more important matter.

The rules committee is loaded against action. Chairman Henry is hampered by membership on this committee which includes such democrats as Edward W. Pou of North Carolina, Thomas W. Hardwick of Georgia, Augustus O. Stanley of Kentucky, Finis J. Garrett of Tennessee, Martin D. Foster of Illinois and Matthew R. Denver of Ohio. Most of the above are standpatists, and secretly or openly committed against the money trust investigation.

The republican members of the committee are John D. Bell of Pennsylvania, who needs no introduction, William W. Wilson of Illinois, not a progressive, P. P. Campbell of Kansas and one progressive, Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin.

Campbell was recently chosen to succeed the late Judge Madison of Kansas. It was here that Underwood stepped into the limelight as serving the money interests and acting in harmony with the standpat republican members. Judge Madison was one of the prominent progressive members of the house. In fairness

Train Is Ditched

DEVILS LAKE, N. D., Feb. 14.—Passengers on the Oriental limited, the Great Northern railroad's Pacific coast train, owe their lives to a miracle today. Striking a broken rail east of Doyon the train jumped the track and rolled over and over down an embankment, but nobody was seriously injured. A dozen passengers are reported suffering lesser hurts.

Of these, Engineer Printerville and Fireman Peterson are probably the most seriously injured. Relief trains are on the scene. It was at first reported that a dozen persons had been killed and scores injured. Every physician and undertaker available was rushed to the scene in a special train, but there was no need for their services.

JAP KILLS COUNTRYMAN

Refusal to grant K. Mimura of the Reliance Lumber company a holiday for which he had been asking for some time caused him to attempt to stab T. Nishizaka, the foreman last night. Nishizaka turned and shot the man three times. He then telephoned to the Japanese consul and gave himself up to the police.

Minura, when shot, was in a towering rage. He did not die immediately. The first two shots took effect just above his heart, but he still kept trying to reach the foreman. It was only after the third shot, which took effect in his neck that he fell. Even then the man was carried to his bunk before he died. The remains were taken to Hoska-Buckley-King parlors.

TO SUSPEND GUARANTEES

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To Spend Millions In Tacoma

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 14.—"Our company is preparing to spend \$6,000,000 in betterments at Tacoma and Spokane," said J. M. Hannaford, second vice president of the Northern Pacific railroad, while in Cincinnati, en route to Chicago on his return to the headquarters of the company at St. Paul.
"We will make a reduction of grade of the Northern Pacific at Tacoma which will cost several millions," said Hannaford. "The proposed plan is to follow the sound, curves and grades in the track will be partially eliminated. There is a big hill at Tacoma. The plan is to build the road around it along the water level. This will be a big improvement. Contracts for the work have been let. The actual work will be during the coming summer."
"At Spokane the company soon will begin a big job of betterment which includes grade separation and other work. The worst contemplated at Tacoma and Spokane will involve the expenditure of at least \$6,000,000. It will require some time to complete both jobs. In addition to this work it is our intention to improve the road along the Pacific coast."
