HANG FOUR TO AVENGE DEATH

(By United Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Feb. 16.—Phillip Somerling and Thomas Schultz, convicted with Ewald and Frank Shblawski of the murder of Fred Guelzow, were hanged here at 10:50 a. m. today. The two Shblawskis were executed at 10:14.

Superior Judge McKinley denied a motion to stay the executions of Ewald and Frank Shblawski, Phillip Somerling and Thomas Schultz on the ground that the four men are insane. The convicted men made a final confession to Father O'Brien, who left them at midnight. He said they were prepared to die.

ALL BUT FOUR MEN ARRESTED

ASHTON HOME TO MEET PORT COMMISSION

STRIKERS WIN

LAWRENCE, Mass., Feb. 16.—Virtual surrender to the demand of the striking textile workers was made by the mill operators here this afternoon when a statement from officials of the Wood mill, one of the American Woolen company's mills, was read to the wool sorters offering to take them back at a wage increase of from eight to ten per cent. It is believed the operators will now grant the demands of all other strikers.
