Louisa May Alcott's "Little Women" has been dramatized. What girl of today—or yesterday—hasn't idolized the Apollo-like Laurie, the paragon of all irresistible traits, who hasn't been inspired by the independent, loyal, big-hearted Jo, tom-boyish, lovable and wholesome? Where is the girl who hasn't been amused by the pretty, innocent foibles and fripperies of Amy, the indiscretions of Meg at her first peep into society; who hasn't wept copiously at the partings that surrounded Beth—Little Tranquility?

And here they all are, just over the footlights from us—Meg, Jo, Beth and Amy together with Mr. and Mrs. March, Aunt March, Laurie, John Brook, the delightful old professor and of paramount importance, Daisy and "Dem."
