
Labor Men Go to Indianapolis

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—The automobile business is some-thing in California. Recently the Buick people ordered a shipment of cars sent to its coast agents, the Howard Co. It took 50 freight cars in one train to carry the 230 autos. The shipment was valued at \$390,000, and over \$20,000 was paid in freight charges.



LOSES WITS; MEETS DEATH

BOY FINDS HIS PARENTS DEAD

 SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 20.—As the climax of domestic unhappiness extending over eight years, H. H. Johnston last night shot and killed his wife, Blanche Johnston, and then sent a bullet crashing into his own brain, death resulting instantly.

Johnston was janitor of an apartment house. The dead bodies were found by Lawton Johnston, 18 years old son of the couple, who later told the story of continual quarrels between his father and mother.

Sergeant Must Go To Prison

 COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 20.—Rorney Diegel, former sergeant-at-arms in the state senate, must serve three years in the penitentiary for complicity in legislative bribes. This was made certain today when the state supreme court affirmed his conviction, thereby holding valid the use of the dictograph in securing evidence. This decision opens the way for trials of other members of the legislature against whom Detective William J. Burns is said to have secured evidence through the use of the dicto-graph.

Murderer Plans To Break Jail

 CHEHALIS, Wash., Feb. 20.—A search of the cell occupied by Adelbert Clark, the alleged murderer of Lawrence Bar, Centralia banker, today brought to light a bar and combination saw and knife. The implements are alleged to have been devised from a steel spring from Clark's shoe and from a portion of the steel bunk in the cell.

DEFEAT REBELS

 MEXICO CITY, Feb. 20.—Re-ports received today say that a big battle was fought near Cuernavaca. General Robles, in command of the federal forces, led an attack on Zapatistas entrenched in and around Santa Maria. He used artillery freely and drove the rebels from their positions. No estimate of casualties is given. The rebels also were defeated near San Pedro, north of Teococ.

Farmers School Is a Success

PUYALLUP, Feb. 20.—The farmers course now being given at Puyallup has made a decided hit and it will probably be a regular fixture in the future.

The classes yesterday adopted formal resolutions asking that the school be repeated next year but that it be held earlier, as the farm work is beginning now and the men want to get to work.

WILL ARREST KIDNAPERS OF AUTO

Six youths and the girl will probably be arrested late this afternoon or tomorrow morning on serious charges as a result of a joy ride last Saturday night when they kidnaped the automobile belonging to T. E. Bryant, of the West Coast Produce company. The police refuse to divulge the identity of the persons.

The automobile was located last night in the ditch near Puyallup where it had been driven during the joyride. The youths appealed to a rancher to assist them in recovering the machine, but it was stuck fast in the mud and badly damaged. The members of the party returned to Tacoma by street car.

Doctor Cuts Out Own Appendix

 SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—Dr. Bertram F. Alden, chief surgeon of the French hospital, is recovering today from an operation unique in the history of surgery, that of removing from his body the vermiform appendix. Dr. Alden injected a spinal anesthetic and with his own hand wielded the scalpel, making the incision necessary for cutting out the troublesome sac, and gaining prompt relief from a severe attack of appendicitis.

INVESTIGATE LIVING COST

 NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Magistrate Murphy announced today that he will inquire into the cost of necessities. District Attorney Whitman probably will prosecute criminally a number of speculators in butter, eggs, vegetables and meat. The proceedings today were centered in butter and eggs. 
The name cannot be taken off the venire but the deputy marshals here admit they will not be able to serve the juror.

Japan's New Ambassador and Wife




Viscountess Chinda, wife of Japanese Ambassador, who will remain with him at Washington.

San Francisco Graft Cases to Be Dismissed

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—Wholesale dismissal of all the so-called San Francisco graft indictments on Judge Frank P. Dunn's calendar will follow as the result of a motion made today by District Attorney McNutt.

The prosecuting attorney declared that his action was made simply because the psychological moment for such action was presented when Judge Dunn technically denied a motion to dismiss indictments hanging over Abe Ruef.

He directed that the motion be placed in writing and submitted.

In addition to indictments against Ruef, there are the indictments arising from the so-called "fight trust," in which James W. Coffroth, Eddie Grane and Morris Levy are charged with bribery, against Theodore V. Halsey for implication in the telephone scandal; against Jere Dignan, former chief of police, and P. M. Duffy, for perjury in the graft investigation; against R. P. Ashe and Luther Brown for the alleged kidnaping of Fremont Older and against E. E. Schmitz on various phases of the graft situation.

Minority Report Is Slap at Stephenson

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Dis-tracting in every particular with the report made by majority members of the senate elections committee which absolved Senator Isaac Stephenson of Wisconsin of charges that he bought his way into office, the report of the minority members filed today specifically charges that Stephenson "was not duly and legally elected."

The minority report was signed by Senators Jones of Washington, Clapp of Minnesota, Kenyon of Iowa, Kern of Indianan and Lea of Tennessee.

The majority report held that while Stephenson had spent an unusually large sum of money in his campaign, that no evidence had been adduced to show that any of it had been spent illegally. In dis-tract contract the minority report says that the methods whereby Senator Stephenson carried the primary were "corrupt and violative of the fundamental principles of the system of government."

TRAIN ROBBED, NAB BRAKEMAN

CUMBERLAND, Md., Feb. 20.—Seven hours after a masked bandit had held up Baltimore & Ohio passenger train No. 1 near West Piedmont, W. Va., robbing passengers of jewelry and money at the point of a revolver, Brakeman Becker was arrested by Lieutenant Kenny of the Baltimore & Ohio police and jailed at Kayner, W. Va. The police assert the money and jewelry were found on Becker. The robber fired six shots through the roof of the car and robbed 16 passengers.

When searched \$30 in cash, three watches and a bandana handkerchief, folded like a mask, were found on Becker. The police allege that the imprint of a human nose was plainly discernible in the handkerchief. Becker told the police that a tramp gave him the valuables.
