

WOULD BLOCK RELEASE OF BRANDT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 23.—Serious differences of opinion have developed between Governor John A. Dix and State Attorney General Carmody in the case of Poulke E. Brandt, former valet of Banker Mortimer L. Schiff, who, it is charged, was "railroaded" to prison for a 30-year term for alleged burglary of Schiff's home, through conspiracy of Schiff, detectives and others.

Governor Dix will await the decision of the appellate court on sustaining the writ of habeas corpus applied for by Brandt before taking action.

Attorney General Carmody stated that he would not appeal.

District Attorney Whitman of New York is preparing an appeal. Application will be made to have Brandt released on bail.

SECRETARY OF NAVY RESIGNS? SENATOR STILL IN THE RACE?



MADISON, Wis., Feb. 23.—Without emphatically committing himself but saying that he has still hopes of securing the progressive republican presidential nomination, Senator Robert M. LaFollette, writing from Washington to reply by letter to Wisconsin progressives who had unanimously endorsed his candidacy at a meeting, he letter, addressed to J. Blaine, chairman, and Enrich Stern, secretary, said: "We are facing a civic crisis. We demand better control of government as the just solution of our nation-wide economic and social problems. The progressive platform must be thoroughly constructive and uncompromising on the great issues now to be fought out to a finish. It is not the time to compromise on principles or men. Troops Desert

RUSSIANS PLAN RETALIATION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 23.—Members of the nationalist party today are considering methods of retaliation against the United States for its action in renouncing the Russo-American treaty of 1832 and abrogating it.

At a mass meeting, attended by fifty members of the duma, resolutions were read in support of the nationalists' proposals of total exclusion of all Americans of the Jewish faith and of tariff reprisals.

ODD BITS O' NEWS

METUCHEN, N. J.—Members of the family of John Conner, a wealthy resident of this city, today refused to become reconciled to the marriage in San Francisco of a son, Francis, to Mrs. Tyng Upjohn, because of alleged disparity in their ages. Young Conner, who recently inherited \$250,000, is only 19, while his father charges that the former Mrs. Upjohn is twice his son's age.

SAN FRANCISCO.—A terrible dilemma confronts the wife and friends of W. B. Nash, who is at the county jail here pending an appeal from a sentence of five years at San Quentin for falsifying a report. He is rapidly losing weight as the result of hemorrhages from the lungs and his death is but a matter of hours. Doctors declare any attempt to move him will precipitate his death.

SAN PEDRO, Cal.—Submarines A-5 and A-3, which left this port this morning for San Diego, are reported to have run into a 30-mile gale about sixty miles down the coast. They are conveyed by the U. S. S. Fortune.

SANTA CRUZ, Cal.—Unable to find a motive for murder, the jury here are convinced today that George Freeman of San Francisco, who met death in Santa Cruz hotel last night while he lay sleeping by the side of his 15-year-old bride, was killed by the accidental discharge of his own weapon. This belief is also entertained by his wife, who was Christine Hackley, daughter of Eli Hackley, a prominent rancher of Humboldt.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—With an amendment providing a quarantine against the Mexicans to fly to become effective immediately upon the passage of the bill, the Simons anti-quarantine bill has been re-introduced in the house.

BELLINGHAM.—In recognition of his daring as a thief taker, Attorney T. G. Newman was today decorated with a star and sworn in as a special police officer. He captured two burglars at the point of a gun after chasing them a mile.

DARROW CASE GOES OVER

He also overruled the objections contained in a brief submitted by Rogers on the statute governing the disposition of evidence. He based his decision on a United States supreme court finding.

The Darrow case went over the trial date is to be set next week.

Hearst Is Sued; Libel Charge

(By United Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Feb. 23.—William R. Hearst, Andrew M. Lawrence and the Illinois Printing and Publishing Co. are defendants in a suit for libel filed by Roger C. Sullivan of Chicago. Sullivan alleges Hearst and Lawrence libeled him for years, and that recently newspapers charged him with attempts to get Robert Sweetzer, circuit clerk of Cook county, to violate the election laws.

Sullivan asks \$25,000 damages. He says similar suits against the defendants will be filed in every county in the state.

GEORGE STOOD UP

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 21.—Definite charges that the transcontinental roads are conspiring with foreign steamship lines to keep rates enforced on the Panama canal by which they will receive all its benefits, were made here today before the Navy League convention by Congressman Humphrey of Washington.

Humphrey asserted the plan is to have coastwise trade and to provide for the free use of the canal for coastwise vessels. If such a measure passes he predicted that the "conspirators" will purchase scores of cheap foreign ships for the coastwise trade and by agreement will boost rates via the Panama so as to absorb themselves the benefits of the water route of the Atlantic to the Pacific.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 23.—Despite repudiations of his claims by both the mother and sister of George A. Kimmel, the missing bank cashier, who is reported to have been killed in an Oregon forest, A. J. White of St. Louis, on the witness stand here today, reiterated his assertions that he is the missing man.
