

T.R. LAUNCHES CAMPAIGN

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—Theodore Roosevelt will take the war-path in ten days time when, after a rest at Oyster Bay he will start on a personal hunt for the delegates to the republican national convention and incidentally for the scalp of William Howard Taft.
 This announcement was made after Col. Roosevelt had taken luncheon with Senator Dixon of Montana, who, it was arranged, will announce this evening that he will take charge of the Roosevelt boom.
 Roosevelt conferred with Medill McCormick of Chicago, United States Senator Dixon of Montana and Frank Knox, chairman of the Michigan state republican committee.
 Roosevelt requested Knox to take charge of the Chicago headquarters.

BOMBAY, Feb. 29.—A revolting case of human sacrifice is reported from Mirsappri, Southern India, for which a Hindu named Raghundanan, has been sentenced to death.
 The Hindu attacked a party of girls in a forest, seized one of them and dragged her screaming to a pit he had dug. Crying aloud three times, "Hail, Black Goddess. Behold your sacrifice," he threw the girl into the pit rolled stones upon her and covered the body with earth.

JOHNSON NOT YET A CANDIDATE

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 29.—"I am not at this time a candidate for the republican nomination for the vice presidency."
 This was the summing up by Gov. Johnson of California here today of reports that he is to be Col. Roosevelt's running mate in case the latter is chosen at Chicago. Johnson qualified by saying, "I would be a demagogue if I said I would not accept."
 "I am not a candidate at this time. I am more interested in other things, particularly in the defeat of President Taft for re-nomination. I followed the president for several days on his recent tour of California and found he was looking only at the financial side of things that he was overlooking the human side. We want a man who will not overlook the human side."
 "The people are for Roosevelt; the politicians are against him. The only question is whether the people or the politicians shall have their way."

ADVOCATES JUDICIAL RECALL
 COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 29.—Convincing argument in favor of the initiative, referendum and recall was made today by Governor Hiram Johnson of California, speaking before the Ohio constitutional convention.
 "Judges are but men," Johnson said. "They have the same blood, are actuated by the same impulses and by the same good and bad spirits of action as the rest of us. The recall will make no weak judge weaker, and it will make no strong judge less strong. It menaces just one kind of a judge—the corrupt judge—and he ought to be menaced."

DID NOT DESERT
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 29.—Bitter denial of the report that Gov. Hiram Johnson of California deliberately deserted Robert LaFollette in the latter's fight for the republican presidential nomination because of the promise that he (Johnson) would be named Col. Roosevelt's running mate was made here today by Congressman Kent of California.

MORMONS ARE ACTIVE

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 LONDON, Feb. 29.—The authorities of the Church of England are worried over the activities of Mormon missionaries. Twenty-six agents of the Mormon church from Salt Lake City have established headquarters and started out a house to house campaign.
 Besides winning converts they expect to secure a large emigration to Utah.
 General direction in England is under Apostle Ridger Clawson at Liverpool. In each of these cities from 15 to 40 missionaries are at work. The Mormon church in England now includes nine high priests, 290 elders and 20 priests.

Wiley Will Not Leave Office

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 29.—Branding as absolutely false the stories widely circulated that he would resign his present position and seek the democratic vice presidential nomination, Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, government pure food expert, declared today that the reports of his intended giving up of his work in the chemistry bureau were the work of his enemies. Dr. Wiley said:
 "These stories that I shall resign and seek political preferment are manufactured and circulated by anonymous enemies. I cannot fight an enemy in the dark. Let him come into the daylight and I'll fight him."

GOMPERS ANGERED

LAWRENCE, Mass., Feb. 29.—President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor says:
 "The treatment by the police of the Lawrence strikers and the women and children," Gompers said, "was a crime staining black the history of both Massachusetts and the nation. The constitution was violated outrageously. That such things as the brutal assaults of the police on the innocent victims of the strike could occur almost surpasses belief. Such acts create more bitterness than all other actions combined."

CLASH OVER CLOSED DOOR

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
 EXCELSIOR SPRINGS, Mo., Feb. 29.—The first actual clash between Taft and Roosevelt forces for delegates to the national republican convention, came here today and resulted, after scenes of wild turmoil, in what was practically a drawn battle. The fight came at the congressional republican convention.
 Trouble started when the doors to the hall were locked on all but Taft delegates who were at once seated by the congressional committee.
 The fights were barely averted and the Roosevelt faction, barged from the hall, erected a platform in the street, intending to hold a separate convention there.
 Later Roosevelt men moved in to the rear of the convention hall, elected a second committee on credentials and amid a hubbub that sounded for blocks around, adjourned after electing two delegates and alternates.
 The Taft forces also elected forces and the dispute will be taken before the Chicago convention for settlement.
ITALIAN TO MEXICO.
 ROME, Feb. 29.—Col. Beppino Garibaldi, a veteran Italian soldier, today sailed from here for Mexico, where he will take command of the federal army at the earnest request of President Madero and begin an active campaign to suppress the rebels.

Rebels Leave For Chihuahua

 EL PASO, Texas, Feb. 29.—His army swelled to a force of 2,500 men, General Campa today is making active preparations for a march against Chihuahua.
 When the rebels leave for Chihuahua they will leave a garrison at Juarez of only 200 men, and it is believed that as soon as Campa's main force leaves the town Madero will attempt to retake it. Madero today officially closed the Juarez custom house. Colonel Salazar of the Vasquistas, as promptly officially re-opened it.
 The American custom house is accepting goods exported through the Juarez customs house.
