### TACOMA

# HE KILLED NO. 4 in the Wrong State!

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 7.—John J. Hughes, millionaire Arkansas planter, murdered his fourth victim in the wrong state. Riches and power had brought him unscathed through three similar crimes in his own state. But No. 4 was killed in Tennessee.

Just for that little inadvertence in location this gray-haired old man whose cold eyes give one the shudders, has been sentenced to spend the rest of his life in the penitentiary.

Six days it took the jury to decide it, and that length of time for a jury to be out making this one of the most remarkable trials on record. For 144 hours the 12 men balanced Hughes' good reputation when sober with his murderous hatred when drunk—then put him away beyond the temptation to drink and kill. And so they answered also the hysterical prayers of two women—the widows of Hughes' victim Nos. 1 and 2.

Hughes came across the river to Memphis one day last summer, and, unmindful of the fact that he was in Arkansas, shot, and shot to kill. With smoking revolver in hand, with ferocious hatred in his eyes awaiting a sign of life in his victim, Hughes was found crouching over the bleeding body of Tommie Dolan, former jockey, in a hotel room.

The clerk raised the form of the dying man and exclaimed: "My God! You've killed him!" "Let me finish him!" Get away, I say! Let me finish him!" Hughes cried again and again, his murderous anger unassuaged. Officers overpowered him and for the first time in his life the slayer of four men spent an hour in jail. For his prior murders in Arkansas the rich planter hadn't even been arrested. His power was stronger than the law in Arkansas.

Eminent legal talent procured his release on bail, and Hughes hurried back to Arkansas. There he remained, fighting extradition proceedings. Gov. Donaghy of Arkansas refused to honor extradition papers from Gov. Hooper. An open rupture between the two states was only averted when a quiet, gray-haired man, bent and old, applied at the Memphis jail for admittance.

"I'm Hughes and I'm tired of the suspense. Lock me up."

The trial attracted hundreds of Arkansas people, asking for the acquittal of Hughes. They told how good Hughes was to the poor and needy, how he carried food and clothes to the sick and helpless. Probably that was why the jury added "with mitigating circumstances" to their first degree murder verdict. That saved the aged murderer from the gallows.

But the testimony of two women prevented any chance of acquittal.

"Mrs. Ward, who shot your first husband?" asked the prosecutor.

"J. J. Hughes killed him—he murdered him—there he sits now. He was rich and I couldn't get him convicted, but now you've

got him I hope—" Then she became hysterical.

The Ward killing occurred at Haynes, Ark., in 1894. Ward was a prominent citizen of that place and had a host of friends. They were afraid of Hughes' gun and wealth, however, and he was not even arrested.

Mrs. W. W. Scott was the next witness.

"Mrs. Scott, who killed your husband, Dr. Scott?"


"That man there killed him and he killed the best man that ever lived," was Mrs. Scott's answer. She raised her veil so that Hughes could see her face. He shrank as from a pursuing Nemesis.

Scott was killed five years ago. The state also brought out the fact that Hughes had been charged with another killing and had not even taken the trouble to contradict the report, which is generally accepted as authentic.

**All Lean Wasn't Healthy for Jack Spratt; Nor Should Mrs. Spratt Have Had All Fat; and "Cheap" Foods are Often the Dearest Ones; Writes Dr. Wiley, in Third Food Article.**

The balanced ration is that selection of food which furnishes in the proper quantities the four kinds of nourishment mentioned in yesterday's article—fats, carbohydrates, proteins and mineral substance. It is evident, therefore, that the human body cannot live very long eating nothing but sugar and starch. His health would soon be impaired by eating nothing but lean meat. If he should try to live on fats and oils alone he would soon find himself starving and if he ate nothing but phosphorus and lime his life would indeed be short. A proper combination of all these elements, however, produces the balance in his food which nourishes all the parts of his body and at the same time furnishes the heat and energy necessary to his daily existence.

comparative cost which does not include comparative palatability is apt to be misleading.

Of the classes of foods mentioned two may be considered as being prepared in a pure state, namely, the carbohydrates (the starches and the sugars) and the fats and oils. On the other hand it must not be forgotten that almost every food contains all the elements of nutrition. We are constantly eating starch and sugar and fat and oil without realizing that fact at all.

Starch and sugar and oil are prepared in practically a pure state for consumption. There is little choice in regard to sugar inasmuch as that made from cane has practically the same price as that made from beets. One fact, however, should not be forgotten, namely, that beet sugar is not suitable for consumption unless it is refined to the highest degree. The impurities in beet sugar are extremely unpalatable and render the crude sugar inedible. On the contrary, the impurities in the cane sugar are extremely palatable and to many tastes the unrefined cane sugar is greatly preferred to the refined article.

For edible purposes, therefore, although the unrefined beet sugar may be cheaper than the unrefined cane sugar, it would not be eaten. Beet sugar forms a little over half of the total sugar of commerce, and is sold almost exclusively in a refined state. There is therefore little choice in price between refined beet and cane sugar. On the other hand, maple sugar sold exclusively in the crude state, is more costly. Honey is also usually dearer than cane or beet sugar.

In the case of starch the same remarks are true. The principal starches of commerce are made from potatoes and Indian corn. While for technical purposes, that is, for sizing, etc., potato starch is preferred to that of maize, for edible purposes practically the only starch used in the United States is the maize product. There is so little difference in price that there is not much choice. The maize starch is slightly lower in price than the potato.

Tapioca is another form of starch, which is somewhat higher in price and which is preferred to the maize and potato products by reason of its greater palatability. It is made chiefly from cassava.

Among the foods which contain large quantities of sugar and starch must be mentioned the cereals. Wheat, rye, oats and Indian corn are largely composed of starch. From 60 to 70 per cent of their weight is starch. Potatoes, on the other hand, are almost exclusively formed of starch, aside from their water content. Among the cereals rice is predominantly starch, containing from 10 to 20 per cent more starch than the other common cereals. A starchy diet, therefore, would be one composed chiefly of potatoes, rice, Indian corn and the other cereals.

(A pound of lard produces more heat energy than a pound of butter. Dr. Wiley will tomorrow continue his comparisons in the cost of the same nourishing constituents in different kinds of food.—Editor.)
