SEATTLE, March 27.—The first definite step in the harbor development of Seattle, for which \$10,000,000 has been voted for by the people during the last two years, will be taken in the condemnation proceedings to be ordered by the county commissioners today on the Duwamish waterway, immediately upon the receipt of an opinion as to the legality of the proceedings by Prosecuting Attorney Murphy. Bonds for \$600,000 will be issued for this purpose.




