

School opened at the pen, at Walla Walla last night.

Four thousand crabs were caught at Westport last week.

Every plant in Aberdeen is closed on account of the I. W. W. strike and citizens are trying to get a settlement.

Supreme court affirmed the sentence of William Hornaday, sent from Pierce county to Walla Walla for five to ten years for immorality.

By kicking up a row over it the state got \$49,539 inheritance tax from the Senator W. F. Vilas estate instead of \$19,584, originally tendered.

Negroes of Spokane endorsed Taft at their club meeting.

R. H. McWhorter of Tacoma, indicted for fraud in connection with the Columbia River Orchard bonds, pleaded not guilty at Seattle before the federal court and was released on \$4,000 bail.

**Bride Takes 14,000 Mile Honeymoon on Big Bark**

When Mrs. Chas. Olsen arrived in San Francisco recently she completed a 14,000-mile honeymoon trip from Philadelphia around Cape Horn. Mrs. Olsen is the bride of the skipper of the crack four-masted bark John Ena.

She passed the 135 days during the passage of the vessel in performing stunts that have seldom been accomplished by a woman.

While the ship was slowly driving along in a light breeze, a thousand miles off the Brazilian coast, the bride seized her camera and had a boat lowered to afford her an opportunity to take a few snapshots of the full-rigged ship. Hundreds of miles off Natal, Mrs. Olsen dropped overboard a

bottle containing a letter to a brother. Four days later this was picked up by some fishermen and forwarded to its destination.

Baiting albatross was the most exciting sport of the voyage. The pretty bride explained yesterday how she had succeeded in capturing fully a dozen of the huge birds with a string, a hook and a small piece of food. Some of the albatross measured 16 feet from tip to tip of the wings.

Although tempted to climb the spars, more than 200 feet above the vessel's deck, Mrs. Olsen refrained at the request of the skipper.

Mrs. Olsen passed her honeymoon aboard a vessel that is noted throughout maritime circles as the crack windjammer of the world. Besides being speedy and
