

## WOLGAST HAS GOOD OFFER

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8.—Champion Ad Wolgast is today considering an offer made him by Promoter Tom O'Day to box either Packey McFarland, Knock-out Brown or Matt Wells, the English champion, over the 20-round route here Saturday afternoon, June 29. Wolgast and his manager, Tom Jones, are said to look favorably upon O'Day's proposition and will give him an answer within a day or so.

Wolgast is very friendly with O'Day, and the general opinion here is that he will accept. O'Day promoted the bout between Wolgast and Battling Nelson two years ago when the Battler lost the lightweight crown to the present champion.

NEW YORK, April 8.—Knock-out Brown would jump at the chance to fight Champion Wolgast in San Francisco. Morgan said today:

## PHILLIES LOOK LIKE CHAMPIONS

Will the world's championship be staged in Philadelphia next fall? It looks like the Athletics and Phillies.

It seems like "rough stuff" to pick a winner before the flag drops, but the Phillies look like champions—barring accidents such as beat them out of the flag last fall.

One stumbling block in the Phils' path is Horace Fogel, president. If Horace gives Doin a free hand the hustling catcher-manager ought to be out in front about Oct. 1.

The team has everything that makes a winner. It has three of the best pitchers in Alexander, Moore and Chalmers. Cliff Curtis is better than the average, with good support. Manager Doin has splendid young pitchers, who look ripe. Chief of these are Kutz from Wilkesbarre and Masters from Mansfield, O. He also has "Toots" Schultz and Ad Brennan, last year with Buffalo, Hall, Oldham, Seaton, Hunt and Rasmussen.

Philadelphia got Kutz from Wilkesbarre, because it had the pick of the team. Clymer tried to "cover up" the youngster, but failed and has since said Kutz looked better last fall than Alexander did a year ago. He ought to be a strong second string man at least. Masters played but seven weeks at Mansfield, but Doin was enthusiastic about him at Hot Springs and the players are sweet on him. Schultz ought to be right. He was the best of the college pitchers two years ago. Alexander, Chalmers and Moore will win 60 per cent of their games. The first named should be better than last season; Chalmers came strongest when the club lost ground and Moore, when contented, has few equals. Oldham, Brennan and Hunt are left-handers and if the latter can get control, he will do. He is better than when he was with Boston. Oldham is 18, with bright prospects. Brennan will do if the sun is not too hot. Seaton and Rasmussen were coast stars and are well recommended.

Back of the plate is Doin, one of the great catchers. In addition there is Pat Moran, who will coach young pitchers; Peaches" Graham and Bill Killifer, another improved backstop, who will be working regularly before the season ends. This quartet forms as good a back stopping department as the league boasts of.

The infield is intact. At first is Luderus, whose batting was so sensational last year. Otto Knahe, the fiery little second baseman, is a sensation and hits well. Dr. Doolan, at short, is one of the greatest fielders and throwers in the game and in a pinch is a dangerous batter. Hans Lober, at third, is the fastest man in base ball and terrific hitter.

The outfield is as it should be—hard hitting—Sherwood Magee, league leader in 1910, Dode Pas-kert and John Titus.


## Stanford Takes In Santa Clara

## QUICK THINKING IS NECESSARY FOR THIRD MAN IN PRIZE RING

Harry Stout, referee of the West Side and Orleans Athletic clubs of New Orleans, believes that officiating as third man in the ring make a man think mighty fast.

We were fanning a short time ago and Stut said, "Andrews, maybe you don't realize it, but refereeing requires quicker work than anything I know of. You've got to think quick, act quicker and not make a mistake, in order to treat both boxers and public fairly. These aviators haven't anything on referees."

Both Hayes and his manager told me afterward that if Hayes had started to make the pace earlier, they might have a kick coming, which was an acknowledgment that they were content.
