

## STEAM ROLLER MEN BEATEN

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, April 15.—Progressives, both republicans and democrats, are jubilant today at the success of their fight against the "hand picking" methods of choosing delegates to the state conventions, which will select the presidential delegates from this state.

The Taft organization and Harmon-Clark combination were thoroughly routed. Precinct men of both parties met Saturday afternoon and not only voted to have primaries, but discharged the reactionary executive committees who had decided on the "hand picking" plan. Chairman Murphine of the republican committee, a LaFollette man, beat the standpatters at their own game. While the latter were busy filling out proxies for newly created country precincts in order to dominate the meeting, Murphine named 120 precinct men for new precincts created in the city.

A Few Facts About NEWELL SANDERS New Tenn. Senator. Last year Tennessee got rid of Gov. Patterson, whose "awful" crime was his leniency towards convicts. When the "pardoning governor" was ousted, Hooper, the first republican to hold that office in many years, was elected governor over Bob Taylor. Then Taylor was sent to the senate, where he died. Hooper named as his successor Newell Sanders. Sanders was born in Indiana, settled in Chattanooga a few years after the war, and now owns the biggest plow manufacturing concern in the south. He has found time also to help manage the Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis railroad. Early in 1894 he acquired control of the republican party in Tennessee and elected himself chairman of the executive committee. In 1900 and again in 1908 he was a delegate at the national conventions. Since then he, in his own words, has been the "officer for the eight democratic congressional districts in Tennessee under the Roosevelt and Taft administrations." That, you see, clinches his control over the post-masters. Washington says the Lorimer people expect an increase of one vote when Sanders is sworn in.
