KINGSTON, Ont., April 30.—The Mcum brothers and Arthur Brown and Bonner, the desperadoes brought to the penitentiary here on March 12, who made a desperate attempt to escape from their keepers at the union station in Toronto, made their escape from the pen at 11 o'clock yesterday morning in company with a Woodstock convict. The four were captured shortly afterwards, but the two Mcums, alias Jones and Kelly, have eluded pursuit.

After overpowering Dr. Phelan and Attendants Matten and Davis, the tied them up, donned their clothing and got away two miles from the big prison before the alarm was given.


# Bay Island Co. Gets Boat

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30. Attorney General Wickersham is today going over charges lodged against Judge Archbald of the commerce court, which progressives in the house may attempt to make the basis for impeachment proceedings. It was said today that the attorney general will investigate the matter and report his findings to the house.

The charges are in connection with an alleged attempt for the sale of culm, or waste coal piles, now the property of the Erie railroad, to an associate of the judge. It is charged that Archbald negotiated the bargain. It was admitted that department of justice agents had been at Scranton, Pa., investigating the allegations.

# PROGRESSIVES PRIMED TO BOOM COLONEL

Not until the state conventions will the contests between Roosevelt and Taft and between Clark and Wilson be determined.

In King county, the largest in the state, there will be contesting delegations. While the progressives will choose 121 progressive delegates the executive central committee has "hand picked" 121 more.

Carry Pierce County. It is reasonably safe to say that Roosevelt will carry Spokane's 61 delegates and that he probably will also win a portion of Pierce county's 61 delegates.

Counting Spokane's 61 votes, Roosevelt has today 91 uncontested delegates as follows: Ferry county, 6; Whatcom, 15; Whitman, 9; Spokane, 61. Taft has 76 uncontested delegates as follows: Chehalis, 20; Whitman, 8; Yakima, 23; Pacific, 15.


Fifteen of Whatcom's 30 delegates will be contested, as are six in Asotin, 12 in Chelan and 121 in King. Mason county elected six unopposed delegates.

257 Make Majority. The state convention will have 668 delegates, so that 335 will control. Omitting 154 contesting delegates, it will take 257 for either faction to dominate the convention.

The democratic situation is equally tangled with contesting delegations of 150 from King county and other portions of the state.



# NEW ROUTE OF ATLANTIC STEAMERS 160 MILES SOUTH OF SPOT WHERE TITANIC RAN INTO GIANT ICEBERG.



The new lanes for Atlantic steamers plying between Europe and America—agreed to by all lines—runs 160 miles south of the spot where the Titanic ran into a giant iceberg. It is believed this will eliminate the possibility of danger from bergs and icefloes, as the southern limit of ice is about where the new lane runs.

The new route will be about 200 miles longer than the old, but it is said the difference in time of steamers will not be great, as there will be no necessity for reducing speed on ac-
