Make Clothes Hangers In Screens

If you have a screen in your room there is not the slightest reason why you shouldn't have all the space you want to hang light summer dresses where they can get all the air needed and retain their freshness and daintiness while drying out after ironing, no matter how limited your closet space. Most screens have a bit of grill work at the top in a space an inch or two wide between the screen proper and the top rail. If the housekeeper will secure a number of pieces of wood, square or round, about eight inches long, by piercing them in the center and fastening the grill work is usually found, they will revolve and form pegs on which to hang her dresses or whatever else she wishes to get out of the way. Old chair rounds cut in two pieces are excellent for this purpose. When set in between the screen and the top rail short bolts can be used, and when not in use the hooks can be turned parallel with the rail and painted to match the woodwork of the screen. This idea is especially good for people who have very few rooms.
