BOMBS FOUND BY DETECTIVE

(By United Press Leased Wire.)

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 25.—A statement by Detective Samuel Browne that he has discovered a bomb hidden in an unoccupied house here and that he has the maker under surveillance caused considerable excitement here today. Other bombs had been found in San Diego. Starting disclosures may follow.
The bomb was discovered Monday. It was a gas pipe seven inches long and two inches thick, inside of which was a smaller tube filled with 95 per cent giant gelatine.



SEATTLE, May 25.—Mrs. May Richards Barr, known as the "Badger Girl," is enjoying her first day of freedom in 16 months.
She was arrested one day after her marriage, charged with her husband and a third accomplice, with attempting to extort \$1,000 from a local business man who was locked up in his own room and held a prisoner for 18 hours.
Mrs. Barr was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary. Gov. Hay pardoned her while her appeal was still pending.

U. S. Sends Warships To Cuba to Protect Lives

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—Probability of immediate American intervention in Cuba as a result of the negro rebellion there is indicated in a request from the department of state at noon today to send the battleship Nebraska and other warships to Key West, Fla., to be held in readiness.
Pres. Taft and his cabinet are greatly concerned over the situation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—Members of President Taft's cabinet believe intervention by the United States government in the revolt in Cuba is inevitable and likely to come at any time.
The tracks of the Guantanamo and Western railroad, owned by Americans, were destroyed by rebels. President Gomez is reported to be alarmed for the safety of his government and has called for volunteer troops to uphold it. The Cuban government's finances are at a low ebb.
The war department is preparing to send United States troops to Cuba.
President Gomez today notified the state department that he has 2,000 troops in Oriente province who have been ordered to crush the rebellion at any cost.
It is reported that 300 negroes have gathered near Matanzas.
The Havana troops reached Santiago today.

TWODIVORCES ONE LICENSE

Mahala E. Kendall wants a divorce from her husband, Grant, because she alleges he beat and abused and then deserted her.
Ray Trafford, of Lemons Beach, and Minnie Sewell of South Tacoma, were issued a marriage license.

Tacoma's Dock Is Entirely Safe

Tacoma's municipal dock is in good shape, according to the expressions dropped by the public service commission. They went over the whole dock and especially scrutinized the loading and unloading facilities. There is no danger of an accident here like that at the Colman dock last Sunday, it is said.

Englishman Refused To Wear American Flag and Is Mobbed

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 24.—Not since the arrival of Emma Goldman has there been so much excitement here as when the American flag was alleged to have been insulted by an Englishman in a Fifth street saloon last night.
The Englishman was hurried away in an auto, narrowly escaping mob violence, and was pursued by nearly 1,000 men.
Rudolph Schulte, proprietor of the saloon, has been presenting silk flags to his customers. He started to pin one on the Englishman's coat.
The Englishman declared that he wouldn't wear the flag, as he was not an American citizen. He said the American flag was only second best flag anyhow.

Steeplejack 290 Feet In Air, Citizen Says, "None for Mine"

"None of that for me," said a citizen as he twisted his head back and looked up at Charles Poski yesterday afternoon sitting up on the side of the flagpole at the top of the National Realty building, 290 feet above terra-firma.
Then he started hurriedly down street, stopped on a slippery iron grating and came near breaking a leg.
Poski was calmly painting away and at the end of two hours he came down as if nothing had happened. It looked scary, but Poski really was in less danger than the fellow below, for there were no motorcycles nor automobiles nor 18-inch hampans or other devices for maiming mortals up there.

Forfeits \$10,000,000 Estate To Be Married

NEW YORK, May 25.—Surrendering her rights to a \$10,000,000 estate left her by her first husband on condition that she remain single, Mrs. Mary Garland, widow of a millionaire yachtman, became the bride today of Francis Cushing at the Garland estate near here.
Though losing her own fortune, Mrs. Garland retains the trusteeship for her children, receiving \$25,000 a year for their support. The remainder of her income she has forfeited.

EUGENE, Ore., May 25.—Dumping by moonshiners of cornmeal they had used in illicit manufacture of whiskey, discolored a little stream near here and furnished revenue officers a clew which today has led to the raiding of the hidden still.

Single Men Are Preferred

SAN FRANCISCO, May 25.—That the employers' liability act is working against them and in favor of the unemployed men, is declared today by hundreds of married laboring men. The married men say the big contractors and other wholesale employers of labor carefully select the unmarried men because the indemnity would be less in cases of accident or death. The same rule applies to women.

Memorial Day Program Is Complete, Children Participate

The program is completed for the Memorial day celebration at the Stadium next Thursday.
A feature will be the presence of 1,800 school children who will salute the old veterans as they enter the horseshoe. A human flag by the children will be the second number, while the Marine band from the flagship Pennsylvania renders the "Star Spangled Banner."
A. A. Knight, for the Union soldiers, and Col. J. J. Anderson for the Confederates, with Rear Admiral Alfred Reynolds speaking for the navy will be on for short addresses. John Hill of the High school will recite Lincoln's Gettysburg address. Charles Derbyshire will sing and the oration of the day will be by Albert Johnson of Hoquiam.

BILL AIMS TO DEPOSE WOOD

(By United Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 25.—Chairman James H. Hay of the house military committee is pushing the clause in the army appropriation bill which provides that no officer is eligible for head of the United States army unless he has served 10 years prior to his appointment as brigadier general.
If this is adopted Gen. Leonard Wood will lose his position. If this provision has been in effect during the last 75 years it would have barred Grant, Sheridan and McClellan.

REID MADE ASSISTANT

As anticipated by the Times some days ago, Judge George T. Reid has been appointed assistant to Pres. Howard Elliott of the Northern Pacific with headquarters at Tacoma. He will have entire charge of the N. P. business in the west and his presence in Tacoma will greatly facilitate business with the company in this section.
The N. P. has evidently realized that it is an advantage not to have to submit everything to St. Paul before action could be taken.

AIRSHIP WRECKED

LEIPSIG, Germany, May 25.—Torn from her anchor by a sudden squall, the dirigible balloon S. Parseval VI. was destroyed here today, and one of the soldiers on guard near the balloon was injured by the flying tackle.
The Parseval dirigibles rival those of the ill-fated Zeppelin type in accidents which have overtaken them. Parseval II. was totally wrecked just a year ago, Parseval III was badly damaged in a snowstorm in 1909, and Parseval V was destroyed by fire last summer. Parseval VI had already met with a number of accidents.

Hay Machine Is Busted---Case

Oppose Big Loan

NANKING, May 25.—In telegrams today to President Yuan Shi Kai, Vice President Li and General Huang Heing chief of staff, in the strongest terms opposed the preliminary loan of 3,000,000 taels to the Chinese government by European powers. The new government is in need of money, but it is felt the terms are too high.
