Hanford Committee To Leave Capital
(By United Press Leased Wire.)
SEATTLE, June 19.—A private message from Congressman Graham, chairman of the Hanford investigating committee, states that he and his committeemen will leave Washington tomorrow for Seattle. They expect to reach here early next week, and according to the present plan the investigation into the charges against Judge Hanford will be commenced at once.

The committee, according to present indication, is planning to make a general investigation into Hanford's private and judicial record, and may cover numerous matters not contained in the specific charges made in the impeachment indictments against the judge.

THEY'RE LICKED--TAFT; STICK TO LEADERS--T.R.

PURGE THAT ROLL, COMMAND FROM ROOSEVELT CAMP

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, June 19.—A continuation of the fight on the "stolen roll," even to the extent of holding a separate Roosevelt convention, if the roll is not "purged" was the program ordered by Col. Roosevelt for today's session of the convention. The final instructions were delivered by the colonel at a round-up of the Roosevelt delegates shortly after midnight.

"Stick to your leaders," said Colonel Roosevelt. Support Hadley, Johnson and Record. They will lead a fight to purge the roll. That fight must be made regardless of any other thing. It is not a question of my nomination. If I could be nominated by the use of that roll I should not accept it. The roll is fraudulent. Mr. Root's position as temporary chairman was obtained by the use of 60 votes which are on the roll by fraud. Anything done by the use of those 60 votes is tainted with fraud and is not binding. Any convention controlled by the use of those 60 or more votes is irregular and is not binding on anybody."

At the opening of today's session it was agreed under the terms of the truce that Gov. Hadley should introduce a resolution offered as a substitute of the resolution introduced by James Watson for the usual appointment of a committee on credentials. Hadley's resolution offers a substitute roll for that of the national committee and his substitute roll will be urged also in a minority report by Senator Borah, national committeeman from Idaho.

The 60 contested seats have been briefed so that their facts might be presented to the convention.

The Roosevelt people were prepared to insist that nothing be done until the cases have been finally acted on by the convention, minus the challenged votes. It was expected that the crisis would come when Temporary Chairman Root ruled against a demand that the challenged voters stand aside and refrain from voting on their own cases. In this fight the Roosevelt leaders say it is more than a mere case of party regularity, and that, in the face of the charge of fraud, all who are challenged must refrain from voting.

It was anticipated that the Taft people would hew close to the line of regularity and precedent, using the temporary roll to seat the delegates who are questioned and thus holding the temporary advantage given them in the selection of Root as temporary chairman.

According to the early morning plans, the program did not call for a "walk out" by the Roosevelt delegates. Following their claims that they are the legal and regular majority of the convention, it is their plan to stay and do business.

Among the Roosevelt following there are the "last ditchers" and those who, while for Roosevelt, are not eager for the foreshadowed split in the party.

Roosevelt came from his apartment on the top floor of the Congress hotel today smiling and apparently in the best of spirits. A conference was held immediately between the colonel, James E. Cortelyou and several other lieutenants. Coming out of the conference, Garfield was asked what the prospects were for a bolt today.

TAFT MEN WOULD BE WILLING TO LET COLONEL BOLT

CHICAGO, June 19.—That they expect and hope Colonel Roosevelt's influence on his delegates will result in the bolting or attempting the organization of a second convention on the Coliseum floor was admitted by the uncompromising Taft leaders just before the convention resumed its sessions today. They carefully counted noses on the Roosevelt demand put forth through Governor Hadley of Missouri that the seated Taft contested delegates be eliminated. They declared they had against this proposition more votes than were cast for Senator Root yesterday. And they will welcome a walkout by the Roosevelt field force because, they declare positively, such a move would purge the party of populism, socialism and all other issues. They also say such an action would not be countenanced by the republicans of the nation.

Barnes Talks.
"The Roosevelt men have helped organize this convention," said William Barnes, Jr., today.

Other Taft leaders took the same view. They stated that the regular republican convention came into being with the election of Senator Root as temporary chairman.

By mandamus proceedings brought in every state, the anti-Roosevelt men will, if necessary they say, force the recognition of their ticket as the regular republican ticket and they will, they say, prevent the recognized Roosevelt electors in such states as Missouri, Pennsylvania and West Virginia voting for anyone but the candidate bearing the trademark of republicanism.

The legal experts of the Taft forces spent nearly all night examining the law and precedents affecting such a condition. And they have agreed that the progressives cannot be made to stick together.

President Taft, some of his friends believe, would now be willing to withdraw as a candidate if assured that the Roosevelt men have been defeated.

If the Roosevelt forces draw out the delegates remaining in the regular convention will have no alternative but to name the president for a second term.

The crux of the situation, therefore, rested with the Roosevelt men today. The real Taft leaders quietly but confidently asserted early today that their opponents would remain regular.

"We Have 'Em Licked," McKinley.
"We have them licked and we will make them take their medicine," was the last word of Congressman McKinley to his floor managers as they entered the convention hall. This attitude was taken by Secretary Hilles and among the Taft men, today they were an adamant wall against the Roosevelt forces.

NINTH HOUR SWITCH TO GOV., MISTAKE

CHICAGO, June 19.—When the national republican convention resumed its session this morning the Roosevelt forces were fighting in the last ditch. Outgeneraled all along the line in the opening session, their leaders faltering when a revolutionary program was actually faced, the conservatives failed to present the nomination they had counted on.

Feud Revealed.
The ninth hour switch from Borah to McGovern proved an error in judgment and instead of whipping the LaFollette men into line with McGovern, they had brought home to the convention the bitter feud between the Wisconsin senator and the Oyster Bay candidate.

Before Chairman Root's gavel fell today calling the session to order, an attempt had been made to get the Roosevelt men solidly together again.

Prior to the assembling of the convention today the bolt outlook was very feeble, some of the progressive leaders even holding that when the progressives put McGovern in the field against Root and voted for him, they became morally bound, as party men, to abide by the result.

While the election of Senator Root is conceded to have been a

Taft victory and concededly strengthens the conservative posts as to the presidential nomination it is not by any means thought to have settled the question of Taft's ultimate success.

An interesting overnight development was the "dark horse" talk for Elihu Root among the conservatives. Root's speech as temporary chairman was the effort of his life and those who are close to him are saying today that while he is loyal to President Taft he realizes that the latter's nomination is at least a difficult proposition and that when he made his speech he was inspired by the thought that his own nomination might be won by it.

Yesterday's collapse of the Roosevelt plan of battle came a few minutes before the convention was called to order—due largely to absence from the floor of the commander-in-chief of the progressives.

The Taft organization was complete in every detail. Every movement of the Roosevelt forces was anticipated—even to a storming of the stage by protesting Roosevelt followers. The aisles were manned by uniformed policemen and an army of plain clothes-men and secret service officers.
