

WORLD FAMOUS BOXER AND DEVELOPER OF FIGHTERS WRITES EXPRESSLY FOR THE TIMES WHY HE REFUSED TO TRAIN JIM FLYNN—HOT SHOT FROM THE HEART OF THE FLYNN CAMP.

(When Tommy Ryan was engaged to prepare Jim Flynn for the fight with Jack Johnson, fight followers began to believe the Pueblo fireman had a chance. This feeling grew when alleged statements by Ryan from Las Vegas gave the white man a good chance to win the heavyweight title. Ryan made a fighter of Jim Jeffries, and Johnson wanted him as trainer when he was matched with Jeffries. He is the greatest coach and conditioner of boxers in the world, and his judgment is considered good enough by shrewd gamblers to stake their money upon. His opinion of Flynn carries more weight than that of a score of so-called "experts."—Editor.)

EAST LAS VEGAS, N. M., June 24.—I was engaged by Jack Curly of Chicago, Flynn's manager, to train Jim Flynn for his contest with Champion Jack Johnson.

After being with Flynn for two weeks and trying, during this time, to satisfy myself he was the right man to fight Johnson, I fail to see where he has one chance in a thousand to win.

Jim Flynn is a light heavy-weight, and he should not weigh more than 175 pounds in condition to box, being but a trifle over five feet nine inches tall, his reach being very short; and he knows nothing about fighting, save to go in and slug—and he has to go to close quarters to do that.

Flynn has a bad temper and will take advice from no one.

If I could see my way clear to say Flynn was an even match for Johnson I would be pleased to do so, but I CANNOT. He is too small. He may be a game man, and may believe he can beat Johnson, but I do not agree with him.

I could get some easy money just by saying that Flynn has an even chance, but I will not say so, because I do not believe he has.

Flynn is outclassed every way you put it, and in my opinion the match never should have been made, for it is nothing but a set-up for Johnson.

The champion is a great fighter, and has every natural advantage that a man could have. He has the reach, height and weight, and is twice as clever as Flynn.
