**TAMMANY FLOP TO CLARK ON TENTH BALLOT IS FUTILE**

(By United Press Leased Wire.)  
BALTIMORE, June 29.—Murphy, of Tammany hall, issued his ultimatum to the Clark managers shortly after 10 o'clock today. It was: "Put Clark over quick." That the speaker's lieutenants realized the Tammany chieftain's edict concealed a threat was evident from the instantaneous effort which was put forth to proselyte Underwood, Harmon and Wilson delegates.

Senator Bankhead, Underwood's campaign manager, was summoned to the Emerson hotel, where the Clarkites assembled in a war council to plan the strategic moves of their culminating efforts.

Bankhead, Ollie James, Senator Stone, former Senators Dubois and Pettigrew attended.

"I will not deny that Underwood's friends have been conferring with us, but it would spoil things to tell our plans just now," said Dubois.

From an Underwood lieutenant however, it was learned that the Clark forces will concentrate their forces to "put over the candidate on the first ballot of the afternoon session."

They hope to have the aid of 123 Underwood votes, 29 Harmon Ohioans and 10 Oklahomans to start the defection from the Wilson column.

Senator Stone, Clark's strategic expert declared at noon today: "We will nominate somebody today sure, and it probably will be Clark, for we are going to stick to him."

BALTIMORE, June 29.—Boss Murphy of Tammany was the central figure in the badly muddled situation in democratic politics today.

When the convention, weary of the struggle to nominate a presidential candidate, recessed at 3:05 this morning until 1 o'clock this afternoon, the action was on the demand of the Tammany leader.

Murphy was up again early today. His efforts to assume the role of a national leader had resulted in a deadlock.

The New York leader has steadily opposed an ultra-progressive nominee for president. He came here obsessed by the idea that Bryan would try to force himself on the convention. To eliminate the Nebraskan, Murphy backed Judge Parker for the temporary chairmanship. He won.

Then came the surprising Bryan appeal to the country. Immediate and emphatic response caused Murphy to back up. He let it be known that no platform could be constructed that would be too radical for him.

**SAILOR FALLS INTO SOUND**

There is one man who will raise no question when told the waters of Puget Sound are cool enough to be invigorating. He is a Jakey on the U. S. cruiser Maryland. As the boat was coming into the harbor around Vancouver Island yesterday the luckless sailor lost his balance and fell into the sound. Buoys were released at once and boats were lowered. The sailor reached a buoy, was picked up and back on board in five minutes.

But his teeth were chattering.
