He would talk of boats making such landings and of smugglers who made big profits through engaging in the traffic of Chinese smuggling.

It Is Easy To Be Good But It Is Hard To Do Right Says Margaret Illington As "Maggie"


"Right—that's the word, I want to do right. It's easy to be good. It is much harder to do right."
And has Maggie Schultz, a plain, unadorned tenement dweller, the wife of an unemployed longshoreman, worked out her problem.
Maggie knew how to be good. She was familiar with the Ten Commandments. She knew that one of them said, "Thou shalt not steal." She knew that the laws of the land—the laws of man, made theft a crime. She might have been good and not have stolen.
"But I want to be right." She wanted to be right to her unborn babe. She wanted to give it a square deal. "When do you have to work?" Maggie's husband asked.
"I don't know. I have to be there all day."

HOPKINS TO START TERM

Robert M. Hopkins, former federal court clerk at Seattle, is today beginning a two year sentence at McNeil's island penitentiary. He abandoned hope of getting out of the toils of the law yesterday, went before Judge Cushman and withdrew his demurrers to the indictments against him entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and \$1,000 fine.
Hopkins was for years clerk of the court at Seattle and embezzled about \$20,000. Most of it was paid back to the government after he was removed last year.


