


15 MILE RUN IS TO BE STAGED IN TACOMA

James Fitzgerald, better known as "Jimmie" Fitzgerald, the crack 15 mile marathoner, of Calgary, Alb., hit town Saturday morning and after a conference with Russ Hall issued a deft to Victor Norman, the crack Northwest 15-miler, who so sensationally defeated Split-the-Wind, the Eskimo, and half a dozen local men here last fall.

Norman came back with an offer to run Fitzgerald any distance and Russ Hall is trying to bring the men to terms. Just when the match will be staged has not yet been determined but it will probably occur in the Glide rink where the other marathon was run.

Cy Young Declares Horse Sense Wins Reputation



CY YUONG PRACTICES WHAT HE PREACHES.

Here's a Little Sermon on Morals and Hygiene from a Doctor of the Philosophy of Common Sense.

The very best advice I can give to any young ball player is—use common horse sense.

The player with natural ability who uses horse sense is bound to make a reputation that will be a lasting credit to himself.

No one outside of baseball has the least idea of the temptations thrown in the way of a player, and unfortunately, the better the player is, the more alluring the temptations he finds it hard to resist, even if he happens to be a young fellow with a lot of will power.

Right living and a clear brain are the biggest helps a man can have in any kind of business; certainly in baseball they are a player's stock in trade.

Every player should have his money. If he isn't spending the money he earns on the diamond he is not nearly so apt to go wrong. The temptation to a youngster, especially in the major league, where he probably feels the allurements of big cities for the first time, is almost irresistible. The man who can pass temptation without faltering, get his bank roll into safekeeping, keep regular hours and refrain from being a glutton in either eating or drinking, will, with natural ability, come out on top, with the respect of the public and money to take care of him when he is no longer useful as a player.

Almost as many players are routed in the off season as during the playing months. Too many young players make the fatal mistake of loafing all winter, or of securing employment at work which keeps them indoors, and this is poison to an athlete.

This may not tell upon them for a while, but it's bound to in the long run; and of course, if a man goes into baseball as a means of livelihood, he wants to stay as long as possible.

A farm, I think, is the ideal place to winter. You don't need to do hard manual labor, but the farmer get plenty of exercise and enough rest to keep in good condition.
