ROGERS MAKES GREAT SPEECH FOR DARROW

(By United Press Leased Wire.) HALL OF RECORDS, LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 14.—"Gentlemen of the jury, you are asked to convict Clarence S. Darrow, one of the leading figures of the American bar, on the uncorroborated word of Bert H. Franklin, a self-confessed felon."

Touching on every feature of the trial, illustrating his address with charts, word lists of witnesses and diagrams, Rogers made a great address. Even Juror Ritter, who sat with his face to the wall during the speeches of Assistant District Attorney Ford and Defense Counsel Appel, faced the speaker and watched Rogers closely all morning.

Rogers closed his morning address with an arraignment of Assistant District Attorney Ford as the entire case against Darrow. Because Ford accused the defense of attributing to the late Judge Cyrus S. McNutt statements that, according to the prosecution he never made, Rogers turned wrathfully to the prosecutor, calling him a "purient-minded, eally tongued person who would deprecate the grave of a dead man."


Woman Swindler Delayed

The mind reader blindfolds himself (the better to concentrate his mind); another person draws on a card something simple, like a cross or a circle at first. Can the mind reader describe the figure? A better way is to place a tablet in the mind reader's hand and allow him to draw the outlines of what he sees. CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Angered because a constable submitted for jurors three men he had found loafing in a livery stable and three from a pool room, "Judge" Catherine Waugh McCulloch, of Evanston, the only woman Justice of the peace in the country, yelled, "I want highbrow jurors, not bums."

Turning to the constable, she said: "Get Professors James A. James, U. S. Grant, Walter Hill Scott and John A. Scott of Northwestern university and men of that caliber, and bring them here at once."

BECKER SAVED \$59,000 ON \$185 MONTH SALARY (By United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—How Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, held in the Tombs for the murder of Gambler Herman Rosenthal, could deposit \$59,000 in four New York banks since November last on a salary of \$185 a month is the problem confronting the members of the grand jury who have been probing into the murder charge of police grafting here for several weeks.

In addition to the money in the bank, District Attorney Charles S. Whitman asserts that Becker's real estate holdings are easily worth \$200,000. Becker sits tight in his cell, asserting that he came by his money and real estate honestly, but flatly refusing to go into details.

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 14.—According to advices received here today a state of terror exists in Intapa, following the slaughter of 200 natives by a band of Zapatistas who halted there on the march to Teluca, capital of the state of Mexico, only fifteen miles north. The town was garrisoned by about 100 rurales.

JAPS STRIKE SYMPATHIZERS

FRESNO, Cal., Aug. 14.—Thirty Japanese imported from Los Angeles by the California Fruit Growers' Association at Selma for the purpose of replacing the 90 employes now on strike there, quit today when they learned that a strike was on. The plant is now closed.

TO SURVEY BERING COAL FIELDS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 14.—Dr. Joseph A. Holmes, director of the federal bureau of mines, will leave here in a few days to make a survey of the Bering river coal fields. He will be at the head of an expedition of 40. The survey is to be made under the charge of the navy department and the general land office to ascertain the availability of the coal for the United States war vessels. The expedition is now all ready and awaiting the \$50,000 appropriation for this purpose by congress.
