Killing Beef On Cattle Ranch a Science,—No Job for a City Butcher



IT ONLY TAKES 20 MINUTES TO SLAUGHTER, SKIN AND QUARTER A BEEF AND LOAD INTO THE WAITING WAGON.

"Get those skinning knives good and sharp," said the riding-boss to the roustabout as he cinched his saddle a bit tighter and prepared to buckle on his spurs. "Then hitch up the spring wagon; we are going to kill a beef."

The riding-boss swung easily his saddle and with two "buckeros"—or vaqueros, as the Spanish say—rode down the steep trail.

A few minutes later the roustabout went clattering down the step grade on the wagon road, the brake on the old spring wagon whining.

By the time the buckeros had ridden to where the cattle were, the wagon had almost caught up with them. The riders hadn't hurried; a cowman never pushes his horse until compelled.

They rode about slowly among the stock until finally the riding-boss picked out the one he wanted.

"Tom, put your rope on that spotted steer," he said, pointing to a two-year-old.

The men were riding with their lariats hanging loosely over their

arms. Gradually they worked the steer away from the bunch and then Tom started for him. The horse, that a moment before had been shambling along in a lazy walk, went bounding over the alfalfa checks with head up, eyes alert and every nerve tense. Tom's lariat whirled and suddenly shot out, the noose dropping over the head of the spotted steer that stopped with a jerk.

The riding-boss rode up swinging a loop, ready and open. With a bawl of fury, the steer charged him, but horse and rider easily avoided the rush, and next instant the animal was stretched on the ground roped by the head and both hind feet.

In twenty minutes the beef had been slaughtered, skinned and quartered and loaded into the spring wagon.

"Slaughtering a beef in the field," said the riding-boss as the men rode back to the house, "is very different from handling one in a killing pen. Most butchers are absolutely helpless in the field, while with us it is all in the work of the day."

On the Ruddle ranch in California, in which runs nearly a thou-

sand head of cattle and a thousand hogs, a beef is killed once a week to furnish meat for the men.

Roosevelt is coming to Washington.

This announcement has thrown a spasm of terror into the republican ranks. They are whistling to keep up their courage, but it is evident that the standpaters don't like the idea of the magnetic exponent invading this state.

It is announced he will be here for the state convention of the bull moosers, September 10, and will speak in Tacoma about that time.

Congressman Stanton Warburton is believed to be on his way back to Tacoma to take action to go into the new third party movement. He has not yet filed a withdrawal from the republican ticket but it is expected he will do so when he gets back to Tacoma.

Eugene France, millionaire lumberman of Aberdeen, is in town looking for a candidate to form still another political party. He wants a party with just one plank to stand on—reduction of taxes. He says he will put up \$1,000,000 to form and push such a party to victory this year.

State Republican Chairman Beverly W. Coiner has called a meeting of the state committee for Tacoma August 22, at which plans will be laid for the coming campaign for the standpat ticket.

The demand for the progressive party committee for a filing fee from candidates who want to take part in the primary September 1, promises to make it expensive for some of the candidates. Those who have already filed as republicans have paid a filing fee and cannot get it back. The progressive committee now asks they pay the committee half as much more if they are nominated then they will have to pay the state or county another filing fee the same as the first one in order to get on the ballot.

The filing fee business for candidates is going to seed in this state and it is likely the coming legislature will knock the whole thing out and let candidates run for office without first buying the job.

J. A. Falconer yesterday with drew from the republican ticket as candidate for congressman at large to become a candidate on the progressive ticket. His withdrawal was not received by Secretary of State Howell up to last evening however, and Howell declared he would certify all names last night and have the ballots printed. All Howell reports withdrawn are Ballaine and Bryan, congressmen at large; Joab, congressman in the second district; Hodge and Lawrence, candidates for governor. If Falconer gets off the ticket too, as he desires, it will leave only seven candidates on the republican ticket, not enough for the second
