

STATE SUPREME COURT TO PROBE POLICE GRAFT

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—At the request of District Attorney Charles Whitman, Governor Dix today named Justice Goff to hold a special term of the state supreme court in connection with the police graft case. This means that speedy action will follow the return by the grand jury of indictments which may come today. A report was current in police circles today that Police Lieut. Charles Becker, held in the Tombs in connection with the murder of Gambler Herman Rosenthal is about ready to confess. District Attorney Whitman announced today that unless "Gyp the Blood" and "Lefty Louie" were arrested by next Tuesday he would offer a reward of \$5,000 for their capture, "dead or alive."

FIGHT TO DISSOLVE THE MOTION PICTURE TRUST

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Aug. 16.—A suit in equity for the dissolution of the "moving picture trust" was filed in the United States district court here today by a representative of the department of justice. The defendants named include the Motion Picture Patents company, the General Film company, the Biograph company, the Thomas A. Edison company, Inc., Lubin company, Pathe Freres, Vitagraph company and 13 individuals.

The suit asks the court to restrain the defendants from exercising undue monopoly in the moving picture business.

Striking Picture Shows Girl Who Lost Her Life In Plunge From Mount Tacoma Peak

The black arrow points to Miss Hunt in the "line of march." The cross shows the peak which the party finally scaled, and from which Miss Hunt, suddenly becoming dizzy, plunged 800 feet to her death.

Y. M. C. A. party of mountain climbers broke camp in a blinding snowstorm in Paradise Valley yesterday and have returned to Tacoma. But for a steady

downpour of rain they would have left Mount Tacoma immediately after the accident yesterday being the first opportunity offered since to break camp without the women becoming drenched.

GOODWIN NOT BADLY HURT AFTER ALL; WILL RECOVER

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 16.—Suffering from internal injuries so severe that an operation may be necessary to save his life, Nat Goodwin, actor and marital expert, lies today in a critical condition at his home at Santa Monica. He was caught beneath a heavy skiff that overturned in the surf at Rocky Point, forty miles north of Santa Monica, and battered into unconsciousness. Goodwin and Miss Marjorie Moreland, leading woman in his last New York company, and to whom it had been reported many times that the actor is engaged, were en route up the coast to inspect a piece of beach property when Goodwin and the captain of the launch attempted to row ashore. Goodwin was taken to Santa Monica, where it was stated the extent of his injuries could at once be determined.

CANTA MONICA, Cal., Aug. 16.—Four specialists and surgeons are on their way today to Santa Monica to examine Actor Nat Goodwin, who was seriously injured when crushed beneath a skiff that overturned in the surf near here last evening. Goodwin was conscious but a small part of the time.

GREENFIELD WAS AFRAID TO DIE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 16.—Dr. J. H. Greenfield, aged and respected medical practitioner of San Bernardino, will arrive in Los Angeles today to begin the fight for the life of his son, Charles Eugene Greenfield, who confessed

to the murder of his baby step-daughter, Vivian, at Venice. Greenfield believes his son is innocent and he will spare no effort or expense to secure proof. At the county jail, where the slayer is confined, attendants and officers unite in the declaration that the man is feigning a mental breakdown. They declare he is sane and is merely laying plans for his defense. Greenfield spent a sleepless night, mumbling constantly and muttering of the ill treatment he declares he received at the hands of his wife, which, he claims, prompted his deed. He admits freely that he intended to kill himself but that "it hurt" and he desisted.
