

PROGRESSIVES MUST UNITE, SAYS POINDEXTER

PREDICTS SWEEPING VICTORY AT POLLS FOR NEW PARTY


WASHINGTON, Aug. 16.—That the seating of the Taft delegates from Washington by the republican national committee won thousands of votes in that state for Col. Roosevelt and makes certain a progressive victory in the coming state and national elections was the prediction here today of Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington in a straight-from-the-shoulder interview with the United Press.

"All the progressives," Poindexter said, "have agreed that new separate tickets, national and state, must be in the field, and that there must be no fusion. There is nothing in common between the reactionary crowd which, with the aid of the Taft campaign committee at Chicago, committed political rape on the state and har-kari on themselves when they succeeded in seating the Taft delegates. These elements are irreconcilable.

"Since the will of the people has been ignored, the progressives have no alternative but to organize anew.

"The sham nomination of Taft has greatly increased progressive sentiment in Washington. Thousands of democrats will vote the progressive national and state tickets, because the Tories still control democracy."

August Dishes

SALMON LOAF.—Remove salmon from can, rinse very thoroughly with hot water and separate into flakes. Mix one-half tablespoonful of flour, one teaspoonful of mustard, and a few grains of cayenne; then add one egg, slightly beaten, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of melted butter, three-fourths cup of milk, and three tablespoonfuls of vinegar. Cook over hot water until mixture thickens, stirring constantly at first, and afterwards occasionally. Remove from range and add three-fourths tablespoonful of granulated gelatin soaked in two tablespoonfuls cold water. Strain mixture, add flaked salmon, turn into a mold and chill. Remove from mold to nest of lettuce leaves, and serve with horseradish sauce.
