

# SCHEPPS REACHES NEW YORK WITH WHITMAN

## POLICE DEMAND PRISONER FROM ATTY. WHITMAN

 NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Met by a score of policemen who demanded that the prisoner be surrendered to them, District Attorney Charles S. Whitman and his assistant, Robert Rubin, arrived here shortly before noon today with Sam Schepps, who was arrested in Hot Springs, Ark., wanted here in connection with the murder of Gambler Herman Rosenthal. Whitman held back the police, and rushing Schepps through the station hurried him to the West Side prison in a taxi.

Later in the day the district attorney issued a red-hot statement, bitterly denouncing the police for "butting in" and declaring that they only manifested interest in the case, when men liable to divulge incriminating facts against them were arrested.

With the arrival here of Schepps Whitman says that he is now ready to go on with the trial of Police Lieut. Charles Becker.

A confession from Schepps, he says, will make complete his chain of evidence against Becker and other police officials.

Becker continues to maintain a defiant attitude and has asked Judge Crain for permission to inspect the evidence against him already presented to the grand jury. Judge Crain will consider Becker's request tomorrow.

Becker, who is alleged to have given money to Schepps to pay the gangsters who murdered Rosenthal, will formally plead to a charge of murder Wednesday.

## Russia Couldn't Wipe This City Off the Map

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 19.—Russia has just discovered that it has one more village than it thought it had. Recently the inhabitants of Ossipivski, a prosperous little town eight miles from Kabarovsk, sent a petition to the minister of the interior in connection with a dispute over the roads and the minister on inquiry learned that there was no such place on the map.

The Ossipivskians, however,

quickly persuaded him that they had a real village with schools and a church, and more important, that they had been paying taxes for the past 20 years.

Now the minister wants to know how the taxes have been collected, as the government not being aware of the existence of the village, has never received or missed them. An official inquiry is expected to produce sensational revelations.

The widow and daughter surviving him live at 1101 North K street.

## CITY'S BARN MAKE GOOD SHOWING

Commissioner Owen Woods told the city council the other day that Storekeeper George B. Monty ought to be paid more than \$75 a month salary. He said he was not asking it but he was worth more.

What does Monty do? Well, Monty is the head of the city barn. And that city barn is showing what can be done by municipal ownership and operation of industrial plants. There are six different trades represented there. They manufacture everything used in the street department and most of the stuff for the water department.

There is a carpenter shop, plumbing shop, blacksmith shop, paint shop, all in full operation and they save about 50 per cent on everything turned out.

They build all the brushes to sweep the streets, make the couplings for water mains, build wagons for the street department and do a hundred things the city has to have done.

Citizens who have seen it are wondering whether it could not be utilized as a municipal trade school.

## SUN YET SEN IS READY TO START A REVOLUTION

 SHANGHAI, Aug. 19.—A new revolution, headed by Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the most popular man in China, today threatens the life of the new republic and the administration of President Yuan Shi Kai.

Quietly but without any pretence of concealing their purpose, agents of Dr. Sun here are mobilizing an army, and it is expected that a fighting force of at least 300,000 men will be under arms within a week.

Alarmed at the outcry following his order for the execution of General Chang Chen Wu, President Yuan today issued statements intended to fasten the blame on Vice Li Yuan Hang. Dr. Sun immediately came out with a contradictory statement, openly charging that President Yuan alone is responsible for the executions.

To carry out his plans for the overthrow of President Yuan, Dr. Sun today is en route to Pekin.

Shanghai republicans, who protested against the executions of the two generals, attempted to dissuade Dr. Sun from leaving, fearing his assassination, but he departed, accompanied by a heavy body guard.

Government officials here admitted today that a clash is certain to come. Considerable anti-foreign sentiment prevails.

TIEN TSIN, China, Aug. 19.—Confident that emissaries of President Yuan Shi Kai will attempt the assassination of Dr. Sun Yat Sen when he arrives here en route to Pekin, friends of Dr. Sun here are arranging for his protection.

## TURLING AUTO KILLS MAN AND WIFE

 PETALUMA, Cal., Aug. 19.—Their automobile turning turtle today a mile from here, a man named Mason and his wife, believed to be from San Francisco, were the victims of a fatal accident. Mrs. Mason was instantly killed and her husband so badly injured that it is feared he can not live until night.

The automobile turned completely over and the couple, who were pinned beneath the heavy car, were so badly crushed that for a time they were unrecognizable. Identity was established by a letter found in the pocket of the man's coat.

The couple were found by a ranchman, who with the aid of two tramps, brought them to the city. Doctors declared Mrs. Mason had died instantly, her heart being crushed.


## SAFE BLOWERS GET STAMPS
