

ONE-ARMED TWIRLER DOES SOME GREAT WORK

Chattanooga probably possesses the only one-armed pitcher in baseball. His name is Ryner and he pitches for the Sinalco team of the Saturday Afternoon league. His performances are truly remarkable, as he is a Mathewson on the slab and a Ty Cobb at bat. So far he has worked in three games, winning two and losing one for a percentage of .667. His batting average so far is .750, but needless to say, his fielding is not as good as if he had two hands. In a game June 9, against the team of the Eleventh cavalry he struck out 10 men. June 15 was his banner day, as then he did the Iron Man stunt and came out of the 18 innings with two games on the win side of the column, and four hits to his credit out of eight times up. One of his hits in the last game came with three men on bases. It was a three-sacker, and with it he put the game on ice. It may be that the oddness of facing a pitcher with only one arm has some effect on his opponents, but at that, the records show that the work is wonderful. He is doing better than a number of high-salaried professionals we could name and they are supposed, at least, to have two good arms.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 27. was having a hard time to make his way through college and who was dependent on his own efforts for everything.

Of course, he will have to be a good student, ranking well in all the work carried in 'prep' school, in fact his standing will be such as is required by all the faculty committees from the men on the teams representing the institution in open competition.
